FREELAND HERE AGAIN.

Montana Sheep Notes.

The unprecedented demand for sheep and lambs continues and the highest prices ever known in the northern section of the state are being paid. It was thought all the surplus stock was cleaned up recently, when the large companies, without exception, reduced their holdings, but the buyers are here again this week, and are scouring the wool-growing districts and inducing the flockmasters to part with more sheep.

Because of the inability of the Great Northern to furnish cars at present or to give any positive assurances that they will be furnished in the near future, a number of those who had purchased sheep in northern Montana, with the intention of shipping them to eastern feed lots, are now offering the sheep for sale on their ranches, and purchases are very few. One man who expected to ship several days ago is offering 40,000 head for sale, not being prepared to winter them and not desiring to run the risk in shipping them at a later date, and several other holders are offering smaller outfits. The railway company has been unable to supply cars when promised, for shipments of either cattle or sheep, and at present will not promise cars for any date. Prices for sheep continue high, as there is much trading among owners who desire to increase or decrease their holdings, and some of the recent sales have been made at record-breaking prices, but it is feared that the dropping out of the market of eastern buyers will have a bad effect.

The Montana Wool Growers' Association, which recently organized in Helena to protect the interest of growers, adjourned sine die after electing J. Edward Bower, of Oka, Meagher county, president; A. K. Prescott, of Helena, vice-president; G. J. Giltinan, secretary and treasurer, and an executive committee of 13. The wool growers of the state should have the active assistance of every man in Montana who is interested in the raising and selling of wool. The meeting in Helena has brought out very clearly that the wool growers feel that during the past season they have been treated unjustly in the sale of their product, and even if they exaggerate the damage which has been done them in their account, still there is sufficient evidence to make it very clear that the prices obtained for Montana wool in 1906 were not what they should have been in comparison with the prices obtained elsewhere.

The Old Oregon Trail.

Ezra Meeker, the pioneer who is retracing the old Oregon trail across the plains, recently lost one of his oxen, which he used to draw his prairie schooner. The animal took suddenly sick, when on the Platte river in Nebraska, about 100 miles from Omaha, and died.

Undaunted by the loss, Meeker purchased a large cow and yoked her with his remaining animal and drove into Omaha, where the citizens of that city gave him a rousing reception. It is reported that Meeker is now on his way to Indianapolis, Ind., which is his destination.

Barring the loss of one of his oxen, the undertaking of the pioneer is said to be successful. He has retraced the old trail across the plains, and has marked it by erecting numerous monuments. From last reports he and his party were all well and in the best of spirits.

While C. C. Roe of Summer Lake was on his way to a sheep camp with supplies, matches in the wagon became ignited and set fire to the contents which were all destroyed. They included \$70 worth of provisions, \$65 in money, two rifles and 500 rounds of ammunition, a bed, a lot of clothing and four sheep; loss about \$50.
