This is to certify that the undersigned will from this time and hereafter make complaint against all violators of the Sunday closing law.

Following is the state law:

AN ACT. To Amend section 1968, chapter VIII of Bellinger and Cotton's Annotated Statutes of Oregon.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Be it also enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. That section 1968, chapter VIII of Bellinger and Cotton's Annotated Statutes of Oregon be and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

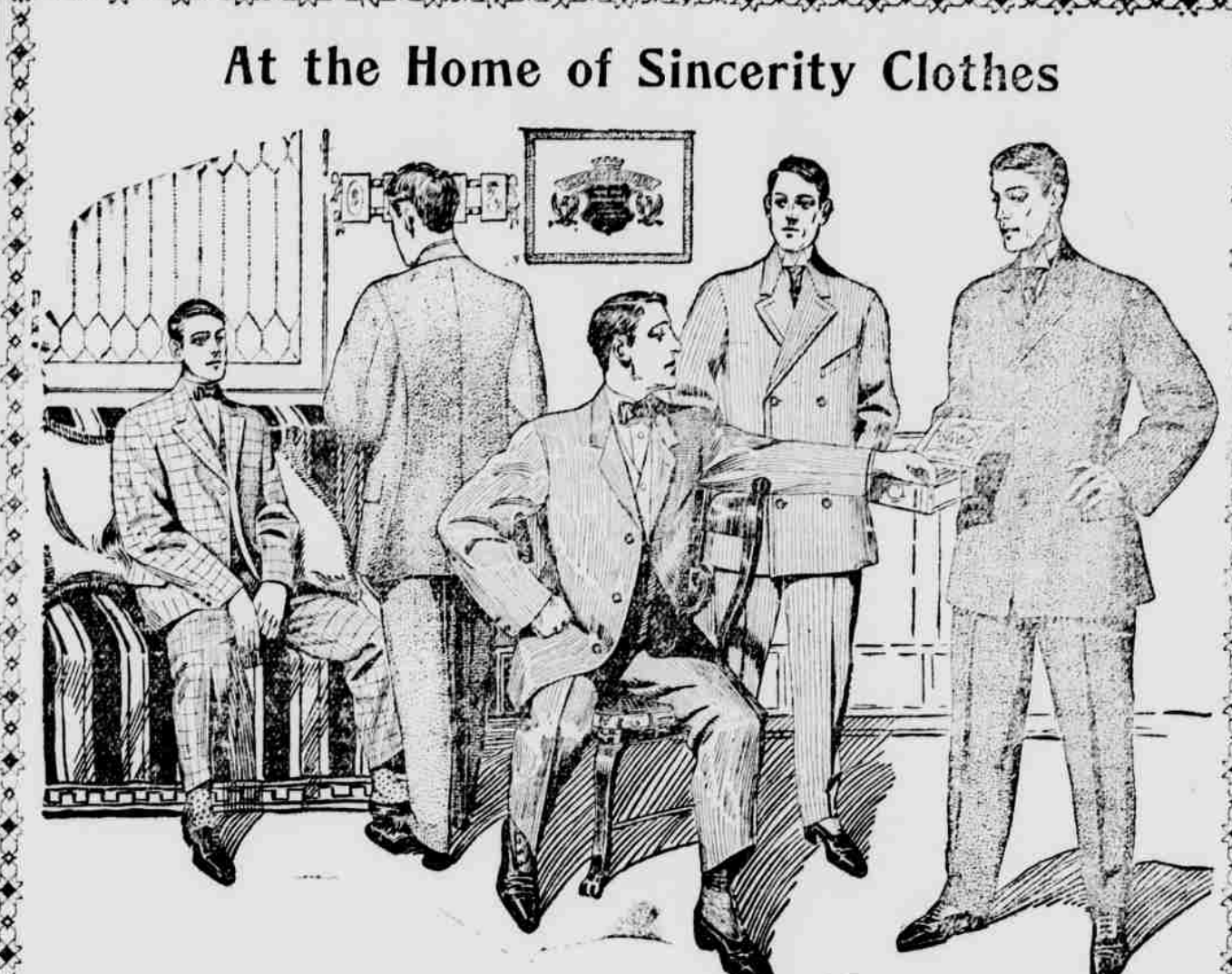
Sec. 1968. If any person shall keep open any store, shop, grocery, bowling alley, billiard room, or tipping house, for the purpose of labor or traffic, or any place of amusement, on the first day of the week, commonly called "Sunday" or the "Lord's Day," such person upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not less than \$5 nor more than \$50. Provided, however, that the above provision shall not apply to theaters, the keepers of drug stores, doctor shops, undertakers, livery stable keepers, butchers, and bakers; and all circumstances of necessity and mercy may be pleaded in defense, which shall be treated as questions of fact for the jury to determine when the offense is tried by jury.
