## Why Don't Homeseekers Come To Morrow County?

Morrow county produces more wealth per capita than any other county in the state of Oregon. Our territory within county lines is 75 miles in length by 3 miles in width, large enough for a state, but with not enough population for a good sized country village. Only 5000 people in the county. Every year we grow about 1,000,000 bushels of wheat. This is worth about

We have about 225,000 head of sheep worth about \$562,000, after shearing while the wool from these sheep will sell for \$360,000. Then there are horses and
