THE PORTAGE ROAD.

Earnings for October Amount to
\$727.02; Disbursements
\$1,238.69.

The October report of L. S. Cook,
superintendent of the state portage
road, as presented to the board of com-
missioners, shows the total earnings of
the road during that month to be \$727-
02 and disbursements \$1238 69. The
total number of sacks of grain handled
was 27,000 sacks and during the season
it is estimated 64,000 sacks will be
moved. At present 11,000 sacks are on
hand.

In speaking of the government canal
it says:

"Smith & Jones, the government
canal contractors, will start concret
work on the outside wall next week
when they will employ 50 additional
men. Their plant was tried out and
with the exception of some few minor
alterations worked entirely to their
satisfaction.

They will use five carloads of sand
per day, some two hundred barrels of
cement, gravel, etc., to each section of
the cement form. The rock cuts on
either end are progressing favorably,
they having two small locomotives to
haul the rock away. Their spur is com-
pleted which holds eight cars of
material and cars can now be unloaded
with dispatch."

Of the Northern Pacific Railroad it
says: The north bank contractors are
pushing work right along above here.
One contractor having five steam
shovels at work. The steamer Norma
is still carrying freight for them, mak-
ing a trip into Celio about every fifth
day."

The steamer Mountain Gem was un-
able to get up the Snake river on
account of low water and is still hauling
wheat from points above Umatilla and
carrying merchandise to these points,
while the steamer Relief is doing the
hauling of wheat from points this side
of Umatilla and the merchandise up to
these points.

May Ignore Fulton Again.

Oregonian News Bureau. Washing-
ton, Nov. 14.—The friction between
Register Michael T. Nolan and Receiver
Anna M. Lang, of The Dalles land office,
that terminated in the resignation of the
former is not of recent origin, but has
been known to exist for the past 10
years. The work of The Dalles office
has been criticized by various in-
spectors and each has attributed the
unsatisfactory condition to friction be-
tween the two offices. No inspector,
however, reported any irregularities
which would disqualify either Register
or Receiver. Strained did relations become
between Mr. Nolan and Miss Lang about
the middle of the past summer that
they were officially warned, and it was
suggested that it would be well for the
service if one or both would resign.
The Interior Department, with the in-
formation now in hand, is not able to
place the responsibility for this friction
upon either party.

Although Mr. Nolan's resignation
accepted last week Senator Fulton has
been notified of that fact and has not
been requested to recommend a suc-
cessor. This is unquestionably due to
the fact that Secretary Hitchcock
wishes to ignore Mr. Fulton and is
planning to secure an appointment of
some one without consulting the
Senator.

It is customary when a vacancy
occurs in any local land office to im-
mediately call upon the Senator from
that state to recommend a successor.
Senator Gearin being a Democrat,
patronage of this type naturally belongs
to Mr. Fulton.
