Considerable progress is now being made on the government ditch here, some 300 men and teams are scattered along the twenty odd miles of the main canal from the intake of the main reservoir eight miles north of Echo. Work on the main dam at the reservoir will commence as soon as the seventy ton steam shovel and four narrow gauge locomotives are got to that point. They are now being moved on an improvised railroad, a short section at a time and it will probably be some little time before they will reach to that point as progress is necessarily slow. Work on the distributing canals under the reservoir will begin shortly.—Echo Register.
