COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS
County court convened in regu-
lar session Wednesday of last
week, with a full board present.

The session was unusually long
owing to a large amount of busi-
ness in the closing up of the old
year and the commencing of the
new year.

The annual reports of J. N.
Beeler, J. H. Allen, B. F. Devore,
Samuel Esteb and J. H. Barker, as
road supervisors were submitted
and approved.

The annual report of the sheriff
on the 1905 tax roll was presented
and approved.

Antone Vey was allowed a re-
bate on his taxes, owing to an
error, after having presented the
proper affidavit.

The report of the surveyor and
viewers on the Franklin hill grade
was approved.

Petition of D. S. Barlow, et al,
for a public road was rejected.

Petition of R. M. Akers for
establishment of county road was
rejected.

The county clerk was ordered
to issue a warrant directing the
sheriff to collect the delinquent
1905 taxes.

The report of the surveyor and
viewers on the proposed change in
the Wayne Howard road was
accepted.

W. C. Cason was appointed con-
stable for district No. 3 to take the
place of W. H. Boot's, resigned.

J. C. Kirk was appointed road
viewer for the year 1907.

Harry Cummings was re-appoint-
ed fruit inspector for the year 1907.

S. P. Devin was appointed
county road-master for the year
1907, at a salary of \$100 per
month.

The jury list consisted of 200
taxpayers was drawn and placed in
the jury tax.

In the matter of the establish-
ment of a county road, petitioned
for by O. S. Hodson, et al. Allow-
ed.

The clerk was ordered to issue a
warrant on the general fund for
\$50 to replenish the emergency
fund.

Fences Must Come Down.

Washington, Jan. 4.—By direction of
the President, Secretary Hitchcock to-
day issued an order to Commissioner
Richards of the General Land Office at
once to notify all special agents and
receivers and registers of local land
offices that the act of February 25, 1885,
for the summary destruction of illegal
enclosures and obstructions existing on
public lands will be rigidly enforced
after April 1, 1907. This order means
that all fences enclosing public lands in
violation of law must be removed be-
fore April 1. If they are not taken
down by that time, they will be torn
down by representatives of the Govern-
ment.

Mr. Hitchcock's order has the ap-
proval of the President, Strong pressure
has been brought to bear to permit the
fences to remain on public lands, even
in the face of complaints.

The circuit court at Rathdrum,
Idaho, summarily dismissed the crim-
inal libel case brought against Joseph T.
Scott, editor of the Coeur d'Alene Press,
brought by Bartlett Sinclair.
