BOURNE AND MULKEY

Elected Senators on First Ballot by Almost Unanimous Vote.

Salem, Or., Jan. 22.—By the unanimous vote of the House and the vote of all members of the Senate present, F. W. Mulkey was today elected Senator to succeed John M. Gearin. With three dissenting votes in the House and four in the Senate, Jonathan Bourne was elected Senator for the full term beginning March 4.

TO EVADE MONOPOLY.
Government to Hold All Coal Lands From Entry.

Washington, Jan. 20.—An elaborate scheme perpetually reserving from entry and sale all public lands in the United States containing coal, oil, gas and asphalt, and providing for the granting of licenses to raise said minerals, has been worked out by the Department of Justice in the bill which Senator La Follette of Wisconsin will introduce this week. President Roosevelt has devoted much personal attention to the matter and has held many conferences with those most interested in furthering his programme of preventing

600,000 acres of public coal and oil lands from coming under the control of a monopoly.

Justice Moody, while still Attorney General, assigned Otis J. Carleton, a special assistant attorney of the Department of Justice, to work out details of the proposed law on the subject. It has been one of the most intricate problems the department has had to deal with in the way of framing legislation, a principal difficulty being to circumvent the schemes of railroads and trusts to evade the provisions made to protect the masses of the people.

If put into effect, the measure will absolutely revolutionize the public lands entry of the country, and therefore it is likely to precipitate a big fight, as the Congressmen from the public land states are inclined to view matters from a corporation standpoint.

The bill of foremost importance among the big measures which the present administration has put forward provides that a person of legal age or an association, corporate or otherwise, may apply for a license to raise coal, oil, gas or asphalt on areas not to exceed five government sections of land. But there is this stringent prohibition:

That no common carriers, or any association of which any member is a

shareholder of, or in any manner interested in a common carrier, shall be permitted to hold a license. No corporation can receive license to more than one area, and elaborate provision is made to prevent associations from merging their respective areas, and so in time build up a trust.

The term of the license, to be issued by direction of the Secretary of the Interior, is to be for no longer than 33 years. There is to be a rental of 20 cents per acre, and the licensee is to be required to pay in addition a royalty of from 8 to 15 cents per ton on all coal mined, and a royalty likewise on oil and asphalt.

Covenants are required to secure the proper working of the mines or wells, or the observance of rules relative to the safety of employees, for the proper protection of the surface of licensed areas and for surrender of the works at the expiration of the license. Provision is made for the patenting of surface rights for agricultural purposes.

A thorough system of Government inspection is provided, and, if circumstances warrant, the President may at any time resume the occupancy of the land and premises after paying compensation fixed by a District Federal Court. The Government also may take possession of all improvement on fuel lands if the licensee suspend operations for more than three months for any other reason than strike, accident or other unavoidable cause.

Opposed to Grazing Act.

Salt Lake, Utah, Jan. 19.—The convention of the National Wool Growers' Association which has been in session here for the past three days, adjourned tonight after electing its old officers with the exception of one and selecting Helena as the next convention city.

The convention adopted a resolution suggesting amendments to the bill introduced in the senate by Senator Bennett, authorizing the president to establish grazing districts in the public domain. The convention regards this as a usurpation of state authority and would have the authority given to the president in the bill, divided between the president and the state authorities.
