SHORTAGE VERY SMALL
Former Clerk Crawford's Amount Cut Down Materially.

A supplementary report of the experts who examined the county books, presented at the last session of county court, and also the action of the county court in not holding Mr. Crawford responsible for trial fees which he never collected, makes his shortage very small, thus showing a small number of errors, especially when it is taken into consideration the former complicated system of book keeping, for a term of eight years.

The supplementary report shows that warrant No. 444 was not ordered in the commissioners journal, but was ordered by the circuit court. Also warrant 1763 was ordered by the circuit court and are perfectly regular.

The county court did not hold Mr. Crawford responsible for trial fees amounting to \$142, which knocks a big hole in the irregularities.
