**WILL LOCATE**  
IN HEPPNER  
Forest Superintendent D. B. Sheller  
Will Open Permanent  
Headquarters Here.

D. B. Sheller, forest superintend-  
ent, arrived in the city Tuesday,  
and is now a guest at the Palace.  
Mr. Sheller will open up perma-  
nent headquarters in Heppner to  
take charge of the work connected  
with the Heppner forest reserve.  
Mr. Sheller has issued a call for  
a meeting of the stockmen to be  
held in Heppner on Tuesday, Feb-  
ruary 19, for the benefit of the  
stockmen who have formerly used  
the range now in the limits of the  
reserve.

**BIG HERDS GONE**  
Range Cattle of the Dakotas Fast  
Disappearing.

A correspondent at Deadwood, S. D.,  
writes as follows of the suspension of  
one of the largest cattle companies in  
the United States near Deadwood:  
The Franklin Cattle company, the  
most profitable in the state of South  
Dakota, has sold its interests to the  
American Livestock and Loan company  
of Denver. The day of range cattle has  
passed. The day of the big cattleman  
is also gone, and the wide stretches of  
country once covered by thousands of  
head of roving cattle are now being  
dotted here and there with tiny houses,  
the evidence of the influx of the small  
farmer. This change in the character  
of the country north and west of the  
Black Hills has been known and  
recognized for some time, but the sell-  
ing out of this large corporation has,  
more than any other one thing,  
brought the actual facts to notice.  
The Franklin Cattle company, orga-  
nized in the spring of 1885, has been  
not only the largest, but one of the  
most profitable organizations in the  
state. It was at first a sort of a family  
affair, consisting of Harris Franklin,  
now known as the richest man South  
Dakota; Mrs. Harris Franklin, their  
son, N. F. Franklin, and Ben Bear.  
Not less than 45,000 head of stock  
comprised the company's holdings, and  
its annual shipments, averaging about  
10,000 head, were largely instrumental  
in making the town Belle Fourche that  
which it will never be again—the largest  
single shipping point for cattle in the  
world.  
In the year 1897 the company was re-  
organized under the name of Harris  
Franklin & Co., and E. H. Harriman, of  
railroad fame, and S. W. Allerton, of  
Chicago, became heavily interested in  
the project. Success continued to at-  
tend the company. During its existence  
it paid out in dividends over five times  
its capital, and the rail roads have profited  
by its shipments to the extent of  
\$1,000,000.  
The recent deal includes all of the  
company's holdings with the exception  
of a few thousand head of cattle in  
Nebraska and Wyoming. These will  
be shipped during the coming fall, and  
the Franklin Cattle company and all its  
holdings will then be a thing of the past.  
This change in the stock-raising in-  
dustry of the west is due not only to the  
fact that homesteaders are dividing the  
land up into small holdings and are be-  
coming permanent settlers, but also be-  
cause the sheepmen, with their im-  
mense herds, are coming in and crowd-  
ing out the cattle.

**PORTLAND SUFFERS.**  
Sleet and Snow Paralyzes Business  
in Metropolis.

The Evening Telegram sums up  
the result of the storm of snow  
and sleet in Portland as follows:  
Three horses killed.

**FENCING OF GOVERNMENT LAND**  
Summary Destruction of Inclo-  
sures Ordered.

A circular calling attention to an  
amendment to the act entitled "An act  
to prevent unlawful occupancy of the  
public lands," has been sent out by  
Secretary Hitchcock to all of the special  
agents and local land offices. It is  
the desire of the department to give  
the provisions of the law as wide pub-  
licity as possible. The circular follows:  
"It shall be the duty of the special  
agent on receipt of any charge or com-  
plaint or upon information being ac-  
quired by him from any source, that an  
unlawful inclosure is being maintained  
by any person or persons, association,  
or corporation, to at once proceed to ac-  
quire sufficient data, including a descrip-  
tion of the lands inclosed, with reason-  
able certainty, not necessarily by metes  
and bounds, nor by Governmental sub-  
divisions of surveyed land, but only so  
that the inclosure may be identified and  
the person or persons guilty of the vi-  
olation, as nearly as may be, and by de-  
scription if the name can not, on reason-  
able inquiry, be ascertained, and to  
at once submit such case, with the data  
thus obtained, to the United States at-  
torney for prosecution.  
"It shall be the duty of the special  
agent, and he shall be so instructed, to  
be alert and vigilant to detect the ex-  
istence of unlawful inclosures in his dis-  
trict and to proceed in accordance there-  
with as hereinabove directed, and that  
he is not to construe his duties as re-  
quiring that, before proceeding in the  
matter of an unlawful inclosure, there  
must first be filed with him a formal  
complaint by some person or persons  
acquainted with the facts, but it shall  
be his duty, as hereinabove stated, to  
take the initiative himself."

evening, Feb. 6, at the Congrega-

**MORROW COUNTY**  
LADIES WIN

**PLAN A NEW STATE**  
To Join Northern Idaho and East-  
ern Washington.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 26.—Holding of  
a convention in Spokane in March to  
discuss the plan of the new State of  
Lincoln is definitely proposed by F. H.  
Mason and C. H. Moore, very promi-  
nent business men, who ask that the  
Spokane Chamber of Commerce issue a  
call to all commercial bodies. The plan  
contemplates extending the south  
boundary of Washington through Idaho,  
thus constituting the south boundary of  
the new state. Montana would be the  
east boundary, British Columbia the  
north boundary, and the west, instead  
of being the Cascade Mountains, would  
be an extension of the east boundary of  
California, the 120th parallel of latitude.  
This would leave Wenatchee and  
North Yakima and Ellensburg in the  
State of Washington, of which Olympia  
is the capital.  
Possible opposition from Idaho to the  
proposed plan will be met by extending  
the present Idaho boundary west to  
meet the same parallel that now con-  
stitutes the east boundary of California;  
thus all that portion of the present  
State of Oregon bounded on the south  
by Nevada would be added to Idaho.  
Idaho would gain more territory than  
she loses, and be more symmetrical.  
No opposition is anticipated from  
Southern Idaho on the proposed basis,  
as it would gain such cities as Walla  
Walla and Pendleton. Oregon and  
Washington would be the only states to  
suffer serious loss of territory, and op-  
position from the western part of each  
of these states would have to be over-  
come by the promoters of the State of  
Lincoln.
