Big Stock Losses in Montana.

BUTTE, MONT., Feb. 3.—Kon Kohrs of Deer Lodge, one of the most prominent stockmen of the state, is in Butte and states that he is in receipt of advices, from the northern ranges that his stock losses will reach about 80 per cent of his herds, so fierce is the storm that is sweeping the northern districts of Montana. Mr. Kohrs says the conditions in Valley country and the other big cattle and sheep sections is simply appalling, the stock dying by the hundreds.

The long plains of Northern Montana afford the stock little shelter from the stinging sweep of the snow and wind. Unable to break the crust of ice covering the grass of the ranges, the cattle and sheep tuddle in bunches of from 50 to 100 in the coulees, there to drop of exhaustion and hunger, and die. Bunches of dead cattle stop the drifting snow, which soon buries them completely, with the exception of an occasional protruding leg or head. These burial mounds of snow frequently dot the ranges and only too plainly indicate how fearfully the herds are being ravaged by the terrific weather prevailing.
