Thomas Condon Dead.

Eugene, Or., Feb. 11.—Dr. Thomas
Condon, Oregon's venerable geologist,
died this morning at 10 o'clock at the
home of Mrs. H. F. McCornack, two
miles southwest of Eugene. Dr. Con-
don met with an attack of the grip about
three weeks ago, and this, in connection
with his age, 84 years, made recovery
doubtful. It was given out today that
his death was due to senile exhaustion.

Professor Condon was one of the re-
cognized geologists of National note, and
gave particular attention to the geology
of Oregon in his book, "The Two Is-
lands."
