Chas. A. Musselman Will Entertain at Christian Church.

Chas. A. Musselman and Chas. H. Hatton left Wichita, Kansas, in June of 1899, on a tandem bicycle, without financial aid of anybody, in an attempt to make their own way to Paris, France, in time for the exposition of 1900. This they did after many trying experiences and narrow escapes from death.

They earned every cent for their trip en route, having only \$2.50 at the start. They plead their own case and won when arrested for causing a runaway. They were employed by the London Dockyard Co. during the severest strike of the last century, being in imminent danger of death all the time. They visited all the important countries of Europe by wheel, including the crossing of the Alps.
