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ONLY THREE
WEEKS MOREOf Colonist Rates—Write a Letter
and Add Another Family to
Oregon's Population.

Portland, Or., April 9.—[Special correspondence.] Every resident of Oregon should at once make it his or her personal duty to write a letter to some acquaintance, relative or friend, or better still to some old home paper, advising that the colonist rates will expire April 30. There is no time to lose. These are one way rates and good to almost any point in Oregon, for \$25. To points East of Umatilla, \$22.50. This rate includes the entire Missouri valley, Minnesota, and the Dakotas, and is available to fifteen millions of people. From Chicago, \$33, and from St. Louis, \$30, or \$2.50 less than these figures to points east of Umatilla.

Houlton and St. Helens have projected a joint organization for development purposes and are determined to greatly improve their community and invite new settlers. The Gresham Commercial and Development League is the latest member to gain admission into the Oregon Development League.

Hon. Peter Loggie, president of the North Bend Chamber of Commerce, has just returned from a complete tour of the United States, having visited hundreds of different cities, and spending a large amount of time at the national capitol in behalf of the development of Oregon. Mr. Loggie reports tremendous interest in this state and predicts great advancement in every portion of the state, in which Coos Bay will be one of the pronounced leaders.

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS
LOSE TO UMATILLAScore was 10 to 13 in a Hard and
Interesting Game.

The High School basket ball team went over to Umatilla Friday, that is, they started for Umatilla, Friday, but didn't get there until the small hours of the night rolled around, to play the club team from that town a return game.

They were scheduled to play Friday evening, but on account of delayed trains the game didn't materialize until Saturday evening when they were defeated by the Umatilla stalwarts in a hotly contested game. The score being 13 to 10.

A. J. COOK REAPPOINTED.

As County Stock Inspector for
Morrow County.

A. J. Cook has been reappointed stock inspector for Morrow county. Under the new law the appointment of county inspectors comes from the state inspector, Dr. Lytle at Pendleton.

In the reappointment of Mr. Cook, Dr. Lytle has acted wisely. The appointment will meet with general approval in this county. Mr. Cook has been faithful and active in the performance of his duties and the stock interests have been well protected.

WILL NOT
RETURN FEESForest Superintendent Sheller
Warns Applicants for Graz-
ing Permits.

Forest Superintendent D. B. Sheller gives out the following statement:

"It is very evident that applications have been made for stock to graze upon the Heppner forest reserve that have never used it.

"Any one having made such application and paid the fees, cannot in any sense successfully apply for a refund because the forage is not there for the stock.

"Your claim under such circumstances will not be allowed."

Mr. Sheller has also received the following letter bearing date of March 26, from the forest service at Washington, D. C.

Grazing on the National forests in violation of the regulations has been declared a crime by the territorial and Federal district courts in Arizona, (see use book p. 187), northern California (on October 2, 1906), and Idaho (March 14, 1907). In Arizona and northern California these decisions, on the authority of the civil case of U. S. vs. Dastervignes (The use book, p. 186), overruled earlier adverse decisions. The only decision adverse to the government on this question since the Dastervignes case was that of Judge Whitson in Eastern Washington. Those of Judges Wellborn and Marshall in southern California and Utah were of earlier date.

Forest officers should not hesitate to arrest grazing trespassers when necessary, as directed in the Use Book, p. 92-93. But this power should be used with great caution and, except in flagrant cases, the circumstances, with the names of the witnesses by whom they can be proven, should be reported and instructions asked, before arrest. This should be done by wire, if necessary. If any court decides against the validity of the statute and regulations, this fact should be reported by wire, so that the case may be at once appealed directly to the United States Supreme Court under the act of March 2, 1907. In the judicial districts where decisions have hitherto been rendered against the constitutionality of the statute, the Attorney General has been requested to ask the United States Attorneys to instruct the Commissioners to hold for trial all grazing trespassers brought before them, and in other districts this will, I am sure, be done without instructions.

WATER POWER OF
MORROW COUNTYDistrict Hydrographer at Portland
Asks for a Report.

County Surveyor Heath has received a letter from J. C. Stevens, district hydrographer at Portland, asking for information in relation to the developed and undeveloped water power of Morrow county.

The water resources branch of the United States Geological Survey is preparing a report for the state on the developed and undeveloped water power of Oregon.

Along with the letter are blanks for data as to existing water power plants of the county, name of establishment or proprietor's name, location of plant, name of stream, approximate horse power capacity and the uses to which the power is applied.

Mr. Heath will collect and compile the necessary data and send in the report as soon as possible.

RANGERS APPOINTED.

Sylvanus Wright and Leo Neal
are Named.

Sylvanus Wright, of Hardman, and Leo Neal, of Monument, have been appointed by the forest service as rangers for the Heppner National Forest.

Mr. Wright is now employed in the government office in this city, to get acquainted and become familiar with the duties which will be assigned to him.

Mr. Neal will take charge of his work on the 16th of this month owing to the fact that he has been detained on business at Canyon City.

The rangers will spend their time entirely during the summer months and grazing season in the reserve in looking after the enforcement of the National Forest regulations.

Forest Superintendent Sheller is getting letters from different assessors asking for information as to the number of stock listed in applications for grazing permits.
