CUT HANDLES OF SHOVELS.

Workmen in Maine Woods, Where Ash Abounds, Well Paid.

When the snow gets deep and the cold bites hard one class of wood operators familiar to the sportsmen seeking game pick up their traps and start for civilization. They are the crews of shovel handle makers, whose camps are pitched wherever ash saplings grow in profusion, and this is almost invariably where other forest workers are not to be found. The ash usually springs up where pine has been cut off, and hence the tracts where it grows are generally deserted except by the men who shape up the handles. Usually from four to eight work in each camp, in the pay and under the direction of a contractor. The men are necessarily industrious because their working hours are limited to only seven as the days shorten and snow flurries become common, but they make better pay than the woodchoppers or river drivers, although their work is more laborious and confined to narrower limits.

The contractor receives 60 cents a dozen for his shovel handles on board the cars. Usually he pays 12 cents a dozen to the land owners for the right to cut them and 10 cents to teamsters for freighting them to the shipping points, leaving 38 cents a dozen for himself, out of which he must pay his men and provide them with board and lodging.

If anything the life is wilder than that of woodchoppers. The men sleep in tents or lean-tos, because they move about too much to establish comfortable log camps, and the cooking is done by one of the party, who takes some time from his work of making the handles to prepare the food. Occasionally a woman is found with a camp, but she is generally the wife of the contractor or of one of his men. Few of the gentler sex can stand the hard life of this class of workers, living in a tent with the men and allowed only the privacy which is established by a cloth partition. Yet it is a sort of existence which cures all ordinary human ills and the handle makers are healthy if nothing more.

An expert handle maker can manage to shape up twelve dozen lengths a day, but men of his ability are few and far between. The average workers can get from eight to ten dozen of the lengths in readiness from the market, ten dozen a day to a man being regarded as a high average. The contractor usually goes ahead of the workmen and cuts down the trees. Then the followers strip, square and cut the trees into the desired lengths, leaving the shaping until a number of pieces are ready. The handles are not smoothed down or precisely trimmed; they simply take on a general idea of the shape, are cut to the right length and rounded with a sort of a block at the end where the steel scoop is to be fastened. The careful finishing is done at the factories where the shovels are completed. Each man will average from \$3 to \$3.75 a day for the contractor after the latter has cut the material and the pay averages about \$2 a day to a man besides his board. The season lasts until the snow gets too deep for snapping the sticks on the ground, and a willing worker, having practically no expenses to meet, generally goes back to civilization with from \$200 to \$300 in his pockets.—New York Tribune.
