Choosing a Drag Saw.
In choosing a saw hold it up clear of everything with one hand and ring the blade with the other, says American Cultivator. It will hum where your knuckles hit it, according to the temper and quality of carbon in the blade. The longer it hums or vibrates the better the quality of the steel. Then look down the teeth from end to end and see that the blade is straight and look along on the flat of both sides to see that it is not "bumpy"—that is, hollow in some places and full in others. This is a great drawback to a saw, as it pulls hard through the full spots or bumps, knocking against the cut ends as it runs through the log. It is a fault very hard to detect in a new saw, in an old one very easy, as the bumps show bright and polished from knocking and the hollows dull from escaping the friction. See that the saw is not too thick or it wastes too much strength to saw with it.

The Work Horse in Spring.
When first beginning to work the horse after a protracted period of rest it is far better to use him carefully and not exhaust his ambition. If a long pull is necessary give him a chance to "take breath" occasionally. If he is sweating profusely raise the collar and other places where he is likely to be galled, and do not let there be a "scalded" place under the harness anywhere. When standing cover well with blankets, and do not allow a horse to stand where there is a draft of wind. Handle carefully, clean thoroughly, feed judiciously, and there will be but little cause for complaint on account of lack of ambition or depreciation in value or a necessity for condition powders.—Farm and Live Stock Journal.

Pure Bred Poultry.
The farmer who does not give the same attention to his poultry that he does to the other live stock on his farm is away behind the times. The progressive farmer, while he may not have pure bred poultry, has at least added pure blood to his flock by the introduction of pure bred males and has found that it was a good investment. Having taken the first step on the road of progress, it is only a matter of a short time when he will discard the mongrel and semipure stuff and keep only pure bred stock. In fact, on many farms it would be hard even now to find a mongrel fowl.—Commercial Poultry.

Hog Notes.
Clean pens for pigs and clean bedding will do much to ward off lice and disease.

A boar or sow that is kept excessively fat on corn alone will rarely give satisfaction as a breeder.

The sow that has nothing to recommend her but a good pedigree should be fattened and marketed as soon as possible.

Better bring in one or two young sows at a time than to discard all of the old sows at one time.

It is a mistake to delay the regular and liberal feeding of the growing pigs.

When the Horse Runs Away.
When a horse is running away it is then that the driver usually becomes as scared as the horse, and the runaway is not helped much. The driver needs to keep his head at a time like this even though he should lose it at other times. What the driver needs to do is to pull vigorously on one line and then on the other with such rapid succession as to confuse the animal so that his fear may be removed. A known runaway horse should be driven with care.—Farm Visitor.

USEFULNESS OF SHARKS.

A Word of Praise For the Scavengers of the Ocean.

The shark is undoubtedly a "dog with a bad name." He is called opprobriously the "tiger of the seas" or the "sailor's foe" or any other scurrilous name which happens to be handy. Much mud is thrown at him, and as he seldom finds a defender most of it sticks. Hard lines this! Because in reality this blue water bogy is a humble and useful public servant, who performs uncomplainingly the duties connected with the sanitation of the seas.

The shark is the common scavenger and general undertaker of the ocean. He is not and, for reasons connected with his very moderate speed limit, never can be primarily a fish of prey. Open any captured shark and you will find clear proof that this is so. A few tangled bits of rope yarn, a battered corned beef tin, a corked bottle containing an insulting message to the finder (thrown overboard by some nautical wag) or a sailor's cap which has been lost in a gale, all tend to show that the shark is a fish of businesslike habits, with a keen eye to any chance windfalls which may come in his way. But the more digestible contents of his stomach, consisting mainly of carrion of every kind, all give the clearest of evidence that the original owners of them were not alive—in fact, were very much dead—when this marine sanitary inspector came along and, condemning them as nuisances, removed them into his own internal refuse bin.

A large accumulation of carefully collected evidence on this point proves conclusively that there are, as a matter of fact, only two articles of his ordinary menu which the shark is able to capture alive—namely, an occasional unwary sea fowl which he may happen to surprise asleep on the surface of the water, and the ugly, octopuslike squid, whose limited powers of locomotion give a chance to our hungry four knot prowler.

The shark, then, so far from being the gore dyed pirate which the novelist paints him, is a mere hardworking, commonplace drudge, and as such deserves, if not kindness, at any rate, toleration.—Pearson's Magazine.

Why Don't Homeseekers Come To Morrow County?

Morrow county produces more wealth per capita than any other county in the state of Oregon. Our territory within county lines is 75 miles in length by 3 miles in width, large enough for a state, but with not enough population for a good sized country village. Only 5000 people in the county.

Every year we grow about 1,000,000 bushels of wheat. This is worth about \$700,000.
