CLOSING RALLY OF CAMPAIGN

The closing rally of the district campaign of the women of Woodcraft was held in this city last Friday and was voted a grand success in every respect.

Sixteen circles comprise this district, and Maple Circle No. 259, was selected to act as hostess on this occasion. Thirty delegates were present from the outside circles. Grand Guardian C. C. VanOrsdall who intended to be present was unavoidably detained, but her place was ably filled by Grand Managers Annie Hawkins of Toledo, Oregon, and Dr. Lillian Pollock, of Denver, Colorado.

At 3 o'clock Friday afternoon, the guests and members of Maple Circle met at Odd Fellows' hall, which was beautifully decorated with flowers, potted plants and the colors of the order.

LEAGUES
ARE UNITED

THIRD DISTRICT ORGANIZED

Morrow and Umatilla Counties
Will Pull Together for Advancement of Interests.

The meeting at the Commercial Club rooms last Thursday evening for the purpose of uniting the Morrow County Development Leagues with the Umatilla county organization, while not largely attended, was full of interest and will be the means of accomplishing good results.

H. C. Willis, secretary of the Third District league, H. C. Oliver, traveling freight agent of the O. R. & N. Co., and a number of Morrow county farmers were present to discuss matters with Heppner business men.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Gilliam.

C. E. Woodson, secretary of the local organization stated that Mr. Willis had been invited to come and help in uniting the leagues, and to give us some ideas as to what the other leagues are doing and also to get an idea as to what we can accomplish as a league.

Mr. Willis said that the Umatilla leagues had accomplished a great deal within the past two years. Through the efforts of the league the Third District fair had been made a success by the securing of a state appropriation of \$1500 to which had been added \$4000 by private enterprise. Morrow county had also been benefited in this by the proper showing and credit of her exhibits.

The Morrow county leagues would now be placed on an equal footing with every other organization in the district. That the combination of the two counties is looked upon abroad as a great factor. The fair treasury now owns \$4000 worth of property which is owned by the two counties.

The speaker said that the farmers had been helped by the organization of the Inland Grain Growers' Association. On the 8th of January the sack question was taken up and since that time 150,000 sacks had been purchased at a price that would save the farmers money.

Heppner is overlooking a great many things was the opinion of Mr. Willis.

He said that he believed that the day was not far distant when Heppner and Pendleton would be connected with an electric line.

He said that while the rabbit cannery at Echo was not a success, that the advertising that it had given the town had been a great factor in making the town what it is.

Mr. Willis spoke at some length upon the Cold Springs irrigation project. That the proposition was at one time condemned by the government men sent to investigate the project, but by hard work of the development league, a reconsideration of the project was secured and today the results are that Umatilla county is getting the benefit of \$1,250,000 of new money.

He dwelt at some length upon the benefits to be derived from an automobile line between Heppner and Pendleton.

Secretary Woodson was instructed to fill out the necessary blanks in order to effect union of the leagues.

S. E. Notson spoke briefly upon the benefits of a Sunday train on

the Heppner branch.

Traveling freight Agent Oliver responded and stated some of the difficulties under which the company would labor to put on the extra service. He said that the car shortage was now greatly relieved and that there are plenty of cars to relieve the fuel shortage. The worst trouble was a lack of locomotive power, but that the company was working hard to help the situation.

He said that if we had any grievances or wants, to place the matter in the hands of the transportation committee, inform the company and a satisfactory adjustment would be speedily arranged.

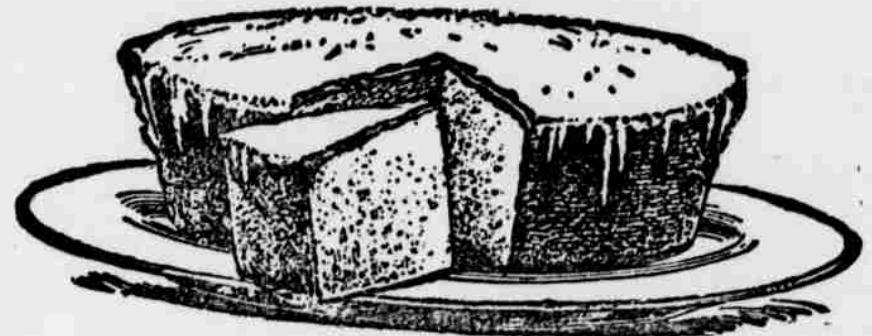
