IN ACTIVE OPERATION

Lexington Creamery Now Turning
Out High Grade Butter for
the Market.

The Lexington creamery is now
in active operation and is turning
out high grade butter for the
market.

The creamery started under
circumstances that are very fa-
vorable for the success of the in-
stitution. There were 18 patrons
from the start, with 100 cows.
The tests of the milk run from
3.80 to 5 per cent. The creamery
will churn every other day and
there is promise of greatly in-
creased patronage during the sea-
son. In fact there are 500 more
cows in easy reach of the creamery.

This is the first creamery that
was ever established in Morrow
county and is the advent of a new
and profitable industry in which
many people are benefitted.

It will mean to the people who
have cows a steady and regular
pension of cash each month that
will add greatly to the prosperity
of the community.

There is no question as to the
prosperity of communities where
dairying is a prominent factor. It
places business on a cash business
with both buyer and seller.

The creamery at Lexington is a
start in Morrow county with the
possibility of far reaching results.
The dairying industry is a trade or
business in which there is much to
learn in order to reach the greatest
possible results.

The time has arrived when there
is room for more than one cream-
ery in the county. The dairying
industry will have a tendency and
offer inducements to cut the great
wheat farms into smaller ones,
thus bringing more people, em-
ploying more people and with a re-
turn of greater profits.

The industry will stimulate the
growing of more hogs, better cul-
tivation of Morrow county's fertile
lands which cannot help but add
to our general prosperity.

Instead of being compelled to
send our money away for dairy
products, bacon and lard, our home
market will be supplied, and we
will have these products to sell,
which will mean money coming in
instead of money going out.

Great loads of wool hauled by
four horse teams are now being
brought into the Echo warehouses
from the country surrounding,
where sheep shearing is going on
at this time. Shearing has already
been done on the Harry Barthol-
mew, Rhea Brothers and other
herds. Robert Stanfield will shear
15,000 head immediately. Jake
Wattenburger has his plant of
12 machines at work, besides there
are other machines in the vicinity.
A large number of shearers are in
the country, and it is estimated
that about a million pounds of
wool will be brought into Echo this
season.—East Oregonian.

MUST PASS INSPECTION

Ruling of Bureau of Animal In-
dustry in Relation to Sheep
in National Forests.

Superintendent Chidsey of the
Heppner National Forest has re-
ceived the following letter from A.
F. Potter, chief the grazing de-
partment of the forest service at
Washington, D. C.

"All sheep which are to be
grazed upon the Heppner National
Forest during the season of 1907,
will be required to comply with
the requirements of the Bureau
of Animal Industry in reference
to dipping and must present a cer-
tificate showing that they have
passed inspection before they will
be allowed to enter the National
Forest. This order also applies to
sheep which are allowed to cross
the National Forest. Any sheep
which are now in the National
Forest must be dipped when re-
quired by the inspectors of the
Bureau of Animal Industry. In-
fected corrals upon this range
must either be properly disinfected
or be removed.

In cases where ewes are to be
lambled within the National For-
est or when early dipping is im-
practicable, it will be within the
discretion of the inspectors of the
Bureau of Animal Industry to al-
low the sheep to enter when the
owner has signed the proper agree-
ment.

Please give Dr. S. W. McClure,
of Pendleton, Oregon, who is in
charge of the inspection work of
the Bureau of Animal Industry
for your district, all the assistance
possible in carrying out his plans
for the accomplishment of this
work and also please furnish him
with a list of the persons whose
applications have been approved
for the privilege of grazing sheep
on the Heppner National Forest,
so that he may notify them in re-
ference to the regulations which
must be complied with."
