MUCH BEEN ACCOMPLISHED

By the Commercial Club Which is
Doing Things for Heppner
and Morrow County

A little over a year ago the agitation of organizing a Commercial Club was started and it resulted in the construction of a \$5000 frame building during the spring of 1906, which stands as a monument and a credit to this organization. The building is a two story structure, well papered and painted, with a gymnasium second to none in Eastern Oregon with floor space of 88 x 40 feet. In connection with the gymnasium there is a dressing room equipped with lockers for each member, a bath tub, two showers and a toilet with hot and cold water attachment.

The upper floor is divided off into six rooms consisting of a billiard hall, parlor, library, card, dining room and kitchen, also ladies toilet with hot and cold water attachment.

The Club has just caused to be printed 10,000 pamphlets descriptive of Morrow county and 5000 of these are now on the road to Jamestown, where they will be distributed during the fair this summer. The pamphlet is descriptive of Morrow county in general, featuring no particular town or section of the county. The 5000 left will be distributed by the secretary of the Club. Aside from the distribution of this literature, the secretary answers from ten to fifteen letters each week, coming from Eastern parties inquiring about this section of Oregon.

At a meeting Monday night of the trustees a committee on reception for May 10 to receive and take care of the business men from Portland and one on entertainment were appointed. These committees are beginning to make arrangements for this affair and every citizen should lend a helping hand.

At present the Club has a membership of 85 of Morrow county's best citizens, many members from outside of Heppner, and has made rapid strides during the past winter. The house has been furnished with two billiard tables, all kinds of gymnasium paraphernalia, card tables and a fine piano, and through these the large amount of the past winter's entertainment was derived.

Through this organization the business men of Heppner have been brought together and much good will be accomplished for our town and Morrow county in general.

If you don't belong to this institution, you should. If you do belong, keep your dues paid up. This is the time of year such things are generally slighted, for the reason business of all kinds attract your attention, but give it your support, boost it along and in so doing you boost your town and your county.

Wm. Stauffer, who owns a large tract of wheat land nine miles west of this city, came up from Hood River Monday evening, to look after his interests. Mr. Stauffer was for many years one of Morrow county's most successful wheat growers, but a year ago retired and moved to Hood River, where he owns a small farm three miles from that city.

TWO NEW ROADS

will Add to Heppner's Traffic and
be a Great Convenience to
Many People.

The new road which has just been opened up coming into the city limits near the Stevenson place in the lower part of town will be a great convenience for people coming to the city from the south and west. The new road will connect with what is known as the ridge road coming from the south. The grade of the new thoroughfare will not exceed nine per cent at the steepest point.

For the Eight Mile country and western part of the county it will open up a much better and more direct route especially to the depot and warehouses in this city.

The road will avoid the necessity of pulling up to Heppner Flat and also save a distance of about three miles as well as a lot of steep grade which will be appreciated by the wheat and wool haulers.

Another new road which was surveyed a short time ago by Surveyor Heath and which is now being worked, starts at the Bisbee place in the southern part of the city, climbing the hill to Heppner Flat and connecting with what is known as the Henry Gay road.

This will reduce the grade for the people coming from the south and southwest.

COURT HOUSE NEWS NOTES

Large Increase in the Taxable
Property of Morrow County—
Real Estate Transfers.

Owing to the fact that county court is now in session, the court house is a busy place.

In the assessor's office, the assessor and deputies are working full time. At this time Assessor Conner is working on the compilation and fixing of property values for taxation in the city of Heppner. The work in general of the assessor's office is getting well along. There will be a large increase in the taxable property of the county.

Mr. Conner informs the Gazette that he has recently received from The Dalles land office 92 land entries which must be added to the roll. These entries include the acquirement of homesteads, timber claims, isolated tracts, etc. From the LaGrande land office Mr. Conner has also received a list of 20 entries of the same character as from The Dalles office. The purchase of school lands from the state will also add considerable in swelling the tax roll of Morrow county.

The new law makes more work in the office of the assessor. It is now necessary for the assessor or a deputy to personally visit every householder in order to get a more accurate account of the taxable property in the county. It requires a much more thorough canvass than under the previous law.

Surveyor Heath has been a busy man during the past two weeks. He is working on the preparation of a new road index which will be submitted at this meeting of the county court. When completed the new index will be a great convenience in finding records of the various roads of the county. The new index will be used in connection with the files in the county
