GOOD ROADS.

The new wagon road recently opened, and which enters the city near the O. R. & N. depot from the west, will fill a long felt want and prove a valuable addition to the thoroughfares of the county. Farmers living to the west and southwest of the city will be greatly benefited by a shorter haul when they come to deliver their wheat to the railroad, as the distance will be materially lessened.

The opening of this road will also be hailed with satisfaction by those delivering livestock for shipments from that quarter as they will be spared the disagreeable necessity of driving their herds through the principle streets of the city, but will enter very near the stock yards.

No kind of public improvement is of such great and lasting value to a town as good roads, and we are glad to know that our citizens are exerting themselves in this direction and hope they will continue to do so until every road entering the city is made a pleasant driveway for at least three miles out from town. It will require labor and expense, but in the end will pay much larger dividends than some other things we could mention.

If the O. R. & N. Co. would extend the Biggs local to Heppner they would give great relief to Morrow county.—Irrigon Irrigator.
