EDITOR GAYETTE:—

Say, do you know that people are coming into the northwest by hundreds and by thousands in search of homes. That they are on the lookout for a location for profitable investment and at the same time comfortable and desirable locations in which to build for themselves attractive places of permanent residence, where they may soon be surrounded with all the advantages of a refined, energetic and prosperous civilization.

The time is at hand for every wide-awake, public spirited, citizen of Morrow county and of Heppner, in particular, to open his eyes to the real condition that confronts him, to wash his hands and face, eat a hearty breakfast, then roll up his sleeves and go to work in earnest, without gloves, to prepare the way for the reception of a goodly share of these home-seekers.

Rangers Sylvanus Wright and Leo Neal have been busy for the past week in getting equipment ready which is necessary for forest work. The rangers commenced active work on the first of the month. The first work of the foresters will be to mark the boundaries of the reserve and to post the proper notices. The rangers will commence at the Monument road and will work west from that point.

Superintendent Chidsey has received power from the forestry department at Washington for the appointment of two more rangers for the Heppner reserve. The appointments will be made within a few days.

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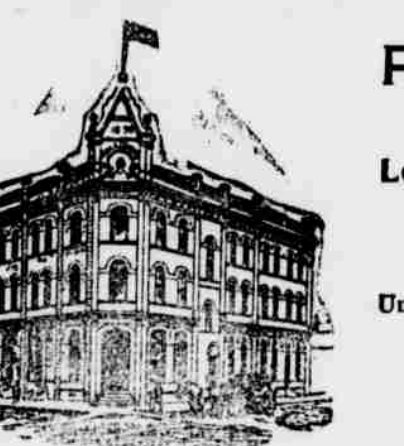
