PORTLAND BUSINESS MEN

(Continued from page one.)

quainted with us.

The address of welcome was delivered by S. E. Notson. Mr. Notson stated that Portland's interests are our interests and that the metropolis could not be a great city unless the country developed. The speaker recited the fact that the visitors were unable to see but little of our country or resources coming up the Willow creek valley to Heppner from the junction. Mr. Notson dwelt briefly on Morrow county's resources in speaking of the wheat, wool and stock outputs, also of our coal and timber interests, emphasizing the fact of the need of more people and capital to develop the country.

Addison Bennett, editor of the Irrigon Irrigator and The Palles Optimist, was the next speaker introduced.

"I am a citizen of Morrow County, and I am proud of it," said Mr. Bennett. The speaker said that Morrow county was one of the best counties in the state of Oregon and that Heppner was one of the best little cities in the state.

Mr. Bennett was greeted with applause in the statement that one of Heppner's present greatest needs was the running of the Biggs local straight through to Heppner. He stated that the Heppner branch was one of the most profitable pieces of railroad property owned by the O. R. & N. company.

The speaker continued by stating that the time was when Portland could not see anything east of the Cascade mountains. Times have changed so that Eastern Oregon is now one of Portland's most valuable assets. That Portland business men were not sending out their hired men but were coming themselves.

Tom Richardson, secretary of the Oregon Development League, was called upon and delivered a short but interesting address. Mr. Richardson stated that the trip had been delightful. He looked upon the low colonist rates which will be in effect during September and October of this year, as one of the main things for the people of the Northwest to advertise for this would bring the people. He said that this would be the work of the Development Leagues. That since the Lewis and Clark fair there was much talk and much interest being taken in the Northwest and that Oregon is now in the lead. The speaker continued by saying that the party was here for the selfish purpose of making a greater Oregon. That we have more to invite people to than any other state in the union. We have cheap wheatlands for which millions of people are looking for. That the Portland business men were here to help the people in the work of developing our common interests, and to push Oregon, first, last and all the time.

Judge H. M. Cake, after being urged, responded with a pleasing and interesting speech. He dwelt at some length upon the ability, courage and enterprise of Heppner people in being able to so quickly recover from the disaster of 1893, and was delighted to see our prosperity. He said that the visitors were not here as philanthropists. He impressed the fact that each community must build itself and should be so constituted that the growler will not be tolerated. That we wanted more people and a division of our lands, and that this should be one of our objective points.

Sedator C. W. Fulton was a prominent figure upon the platform and was called upon with cheers. Senator Fulton said that the great energy shown since our affliction was almost incomprehensible. That we were entitled to applause and congratulation for strength of character. That the visitors were here to get acquainted more intimately and talk over what can be done to advance the interests of the state. He said that it was the duty of Portland to assist in helping to develop our

resources. The Senator was greatly impressed with the splendid quality of coal in our midst and said that this was one of the crying needs of the state. He said that Portland could not do more for the state than to take hold and help develop this industry. While he did not believe in crying down the railroads, for the reason that they were great factors in building up the country, but the country had done much for the railroads and it was their duty to build lateral lines as soon as possible. It was a fact for some reason that the state had suffered for lack of the building of these branch lines. He hoped to see the roads adopt a more liberal policy. The speaker said that he was not in favor of government ownership of the railroads for he believed that the service would be decreased thereby. Instead of putting billions into the purchase of railroads, he believed in putting the money into the natural highways of rivers and canals. Senator Fulton was frequently applauded.

The meeting closed at a late hour and the special train pulled out at 12:30. The trip was ended Saturday night when the excursionists got back to Portland.
