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Now it is not my purpose, Mr. Editor, to run down the man that is working for wages but rather to stand by him and protect the one that is willing to give honest value for his wages against the one that comes on your place to get fed and paid for the pleasure of seeing him lounging around and taking a fresh cigarette every 15 minutes in order to stimulate him to keep up his unlimited gail. Men should be paid according to their merits. You can give some men \$100 per month to work with sheep and he will make you two for every month he works, but there are some that it would be better to pay \$100 and have them keep away. The trouble is men are not generally paid according to their merits. They are rated about the same as sheep have always been bought here in the past. A sheep is a sheep and the producer that tries to get the best very often gets less than the one that raises the scrub.

Under the new scab law the sheep men are getting together who have neighboring ranges and are putting in co-operative dip vats this year. The next move I think is for the sheepmen to build more sheds to protect their sheep and put in co-operative steam shearing plants, as I think the one drawback in a public shearing plant is having the stock away from home in case of a bad storm such as was experienced last year.

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There also should be a wool pullery erected in Heppner, and owned by the sheepmen, if it was for no other purpose than to break the corner on pelts such as they have this year.

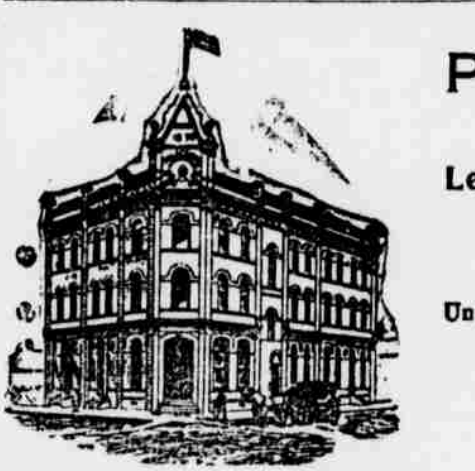

TO MEET NEW CONDITIONS.

Experienced Sheepman Offers Valuable Suggestions.

[To the Editor:—] Please accept a few notes from one who does not make a practice of writing for publication unless he knows something that he can gamble on an win.

The question that I want to speak about is getting to be a serious one for the sheepmen of Eastern Oregon, and one that sooner or later must be revised to suit the conditions now existing. Everyone knows that the sheepmen are and have been for the past three years handling lots of money, but it is not everyone who knows how much more their expenses have increased in that time, besides having to pay up old back debts contracted. Same way with pelts. I saw a pelt sent to the warehouse the other day that had at least nine pounds of good clean long staple wool on it which without the hide was worth at least \$1.75. It sold for the same per pound as a lot of pieces of short fall pelts that had been killed and torn up by coyotes. These pieces were really worth the money but the prime pelt had to be sold for the same because the pieces bore the name of pelts. Where are the merits of the case can you see into it?

There is another matter that is being seriously considered by sheepmen; that is shearing by steam versus hand blades. Being an old shearer myself and naturally prejudiced against machines from hearing reports circulated by traveling shearers and also by shippers, I was loathe to give it a trial, but owing to circumstances by which I was either forced to shear by steam or lose a couple of lots of wool, engaged a band of 100 yearlings to be sheared on the steam plant, owned by Newt. Whetstone and operated by Jake Wattenberger, who to do them justice deserve

great credit for arranging and bringing into operation something that will prove to be a great boon to sheepmen and also to the sheep of this community in the future.

The usual price paid this season for hand shearing is eight cents per head and board for the hands. It costs 13c per head all told to shear by machinery, but I consider that owing to the clean, even way which the wool is cut from the sheep making the staple longer by half an inch, the fleece heavier by at least one pound, and the sheep lighter by at least in some instances a square foot of hide, I have made the cost of the shearing and probably \$100 a head for my trouble, hence this letter.

It is an imposition and an injustice, and will not be tolerated longer than this year for shippers to come to Heppner and demand that all sheep contracted by them shall be sheared by hand. It not only takes from the sheepmen a pound of wool on each sheep that rightfully belongs to them but also works a hardship on them and the sheep in a case like this year when shearers are scarce and sheep have to be sheared, dipped and gotten ready to get to summer range by a certain time, especially when you know it is a well known fact that those same shippers own and operate a steam plant of their own and would not have their sheep sheared by hand if men would do it for nothing. Shippers don't come from Montana or elsewhere to Heppner for their health. They come because they can get the best blood, the best bone and the best wool producers combined, and also a sheep than can go into the feed yards and do well from the start because they are used to being fed in winter time in Oregon. The shipper has no right to say how a sheep shall be sheared as long as the grower runs a good clean healthy sheep with a whole hide.

The producer needs that extra pound of wool and must have it.

Sheep have brought a splendid price this year, but no more and in some

cases not as much as they are worth according to supply and demand, and after the scab law gets into good running order so as to remove the quarantine from Oregon, we should receive at least 25c a head more according to the shippers say so. I wonder if we will. We also should receive as good a price for our wool as last June. I can see no reason judging from market quotations both from London and Boston, to justify any depression here, and as wool is lighter and cleaner this spring owing to the continued wet weather, it ought to be a little better price.
