**OPEN THE COAL FIELDS.**

Portland business men who visited Heppner on their recent itioerary through Oregon and Idaho, expressed genuine surprise at the quality and extent of the Heppner coal fields.

After they return home and cast up the needs of the state, from their observations, will they demand that a railroad be built into that coal field?

Really, is it not a crime upon the part of the railroads to refuse to build to the Heppner coal fields, when the need of fuel is so urgent in Oregon?

No matter who owns the fields, no matter if the railroads cannot secure a controlling interest in the mines, no matter if the output cannot be controlled by the railroads, a branch line should be built into those mines.

If, under the railroad commission act, the state can force the construction of a branch line into that part of Oregon, steps toward that end should be taken at once.

This is only another illustration of the inconsistency of private ownership of public utilities. Think of Oregon suffering from a fuel famine, with hundreds of acres of excellent coal lying under the surface, only needing a short branch line of railroad to open up an excellent coal lying under the sur-

face, only needing a short branch line of railroad to open up an extensive field to market.

Will Portland seriously consider the needs of the state and endeavor to bring about the logical and practical development of her resources? It is said that the object of the visit to eastern Oregon was to learn the needs of the state.—East Oregonian.

**GOOD FRUIT CROP.**

Morrow County Fruit Not Materially Injured by Frosts.

Now that the season is far enough advanced to tell the actual fruit conditions, Harry Cummings, the county fruit inspector informs the Gazette that Morrow county's fruit crop has not been materially injured by the frosts.

In some localities the fruit was injured, but generally speaking the crop will be about average.
