Wool Much Cleaner Than Usual and Consequently Lighter.

Sheep shearing in Morrow county is coming to a close and will soon be ended. Owing to the wet season the wool is much cleaner than usual. Generally the fleeces are a little light, not because there is less wool on the sheep's back, but because of the absence of dirt.

N. S. Whetstone's machine shearing plant was closed down Tuesday after having sheared in the neighborhood of 60,000 head. Wool is coming in steadily to the Heppner warehouses and there will be a large amount on hand for the sales days on June 4-5.

Local wool sales are few. Frank Lee has purchased a few clips. Growers for some unknown reason are not inclined to make public the prices received.
