Experts Now Examining
the Mines.

Outcome is Looked to With
Great Interest.

GOOD PRICES
FOR WOOL

Over 1,300,000 Pounds Dis-
posed of.

Competition Not Keen Enough to
Suit Many of the Growers
Present.

The annual wool sales under the
auction or sealed bid system passed
off without unusual stir at the
Heppner warehouses Monday and
Tuesday of this week.

One million three hundred thousand
pounds were sold at prices
ranging from 16 3/4 cents to 20 1/4
cents per pound.

L. A. Florence received 20 1/4
cents but this was only for a few
fleeces, and is hardly considered.
Nat Webb received the top price
for a quantity of wool, receiving
20 1/8 cents.

Growers claim that the heavy
wools brought prices in excess of
the proportionate value between
the light and heavy grades.

With the heavier grades some of
the growers were well satisfied,
having received as much or more
than they expected for their wools.

With the owners of the lighter
grades some of them feel that they
ought to have received more, how-
ever only a few lots were with-
drawn.

The main dissatisfaction comes
from the fact that while it was
represented that there were 20
buyers, only four bidders bought
nearly all of the wool. In fact
Ellery and Brigham bought the
big end of the wool.

Whether the few bidders were
able to pay more and the fifteen or
sixteen others were outclassed in
the competition or whether they
came as dummies, or spectators is
a mystery unsolved. Anyhow, the
fact remains that about a half
dozen bidders submitted the offers
and the balance were blanks.
