SHEEP MEN NOT ALL PLEASED

Some Dissatisfaction in Blue Mountain Reserve.

Most of the sheep men who are now taking their flocks into the Blue Mountain National Forest are not satisfied with the allotments and distribution of the range.

Morrow county sheep men claim that the Umatilla county flockmasters are getting the lion's share.

The main trouble seems to come from complications from the confusion of getting started and a lack of proper understanding of conditions. The ranges formerly used have been cut up and priority rights have not been respected as the sheepmen.

Another complication comes for the reason that formerly the sheepmen used the lower altitudes early in the season and worked up on the snow capped peaks later in the season as the snow leaves. The way it is now the allotments in the lower altitudes are used and the sheep allotted to the high mountains are forced to go into the snow.

Supervisor Ireland is doing all that he can to adjust matters and the stockmen think that in time everything will be equitably arranged.

and was one of her sturdy, energetic and highly respected citizens. The funeral was conducted by the Masonic lodge, of which order he was a member.

He leaves a wife and two children, A. Walker and Mrs. J. W. Pruyar both of Ione.

The funeral of Joseph Mason, who died at his ranch on Rhea creek, eight miles southeast of Ione, and which occurred in Ione on last Friday, was well attended by old residents of this county and a large concourse of citizens. Several people went from this city to pay tribute and assist in placing the remains of this sturdy old pioneer in their last resting place.

The services were conducted Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Baptist church, Rev. J. L. Jones officiating.

Joseph Mason is a native of Portugal, being born on November 24, 1831. At the age of thirteen years he shipped on a United States vessel and came to this country, landing in Massachusetts, from which place he emigrated to California where he was engaged in mining until 1858. He then came to Oregon and settled in Salem and in the year 1871 he moved to this section of the state and located on the place where he died. He took up a homestead and a timber culture to which he has added to, owning quite a large body of land at the time of his death.
