CALLED OFFFor Reason that Every-
thing is Practically Sold.

Buyers Would Not Wait--Remain-
ing Clips Sold at Private
Sale by Growers.

The auction wool sales scheduled for tomorrow in Heppner have been called off for the good and sufficient reason that there will be nothing to sell, the wools already having passed from the grower to the hands of the buyer.

Ever since the first sales, which were in a general way quite successful, the growers have been inclined to sell at private sale, and the half million pounds of wool that was to make up the second sales has all been sold but three clips.

Frank Lee has been the largest and most active buyer. He has been right on the ground all the time and consequently has secured the big end of the clips.

Growers seem to be all well satisfied with the prices obtained.

AMINATIONTo be Held in Heppner
on July 23-24.

All Persons Who Desire to Enter
the Forest Service Should
Take Examination.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces an examination on July 23-24, 1907, at Supt. Chidsey's office in this city, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of assistant forest ranger in the Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Chidsey just recently recently returned from divisions 9 and 11, east of Potomac and Five Mile country, where he spent ten days. He says that the range is good and practically all the sheep are now in the Heppner National Forest.

M. L. Erickson, forest inspector of District No. 6, is here and in company with Supt. Chidsey will start this week on an inspecting tour of the Heppner reserve.

Leo Neal, ranger, will be in charge of the office during Mr. Chidsey's absence.

Heppner's big Fourth of July celebration, will, without question, be the biggest event of the kind ever held in Morrow county.

The different committees are working hard and not a single thing will be left undone to make the affair a great success for the entertainment and enjoyment of the people.

Attention is called to the fact that Heppner is better prepared to accommodate a big crowd than any other town between The Dalles and Pendleton. The hotel and restaurant men, the rooming house people and business men are making big preparations to see that all are taken care of made to feel at home.

There will positively be two daring balloon ascensions, one on the 4th and one on the 5th, which will be among the many features. This was the hardest work of the committee to secure this great attraction and was only secured at heavy expense.

Prof. Wardell, the dare devil balloonist has made 500 ascensions. He communes with the clouds at the dizzy and awesome height of from 3,000 feet to one mile, bringing into action every particle of his iron nerve in the parachute jump in speeding through the atmosphere back to earth for his life.

If you want to see this daring feat come to Heppner on the Fourth.

Bunch grass horses are noted for their hard bucking and great staying qualities. A lot of the wildest and meanest buckers in the whole country have been secured. If you want to see these untamed, snorting and dangerous horses ridden by the crack riders, come to Heppner's celebration. Morrow county has some of the best riders in the world. Brought up in the saddle, thoroughly acquainted with the tricks of the meanest horses, they know no fear. The best of them will be here and the competition will be keen, there will be no "leather pulling" for the first prize will be an elegant \$50 saddle and the second prize will be a pair of \$16 shoes.

If you want to see a good exhibition of the great national game of baseball, there will be match games on both days by the best and fastest players in Morrow county. The baseball cranks all say that that these games will be crackerjacks, and if daily practice cuts any figure it would seem that there is some truth in this statement. Possibly the sight of that \$50 wallet that is hanging for a prize to the winners has something to do with the enthusiasm.
