Washington's new anti-cigarette law goes into effect on September 1. The new law makes it a misdemeanor to manufacture, sell, exchange, barter, dispose of or give away any cigarettes, cigarette paper or cigarette wrappers or any paper made or prepared for the purpose of being filled with tobacco for smoking.

The editor of Harper's Weekly who has just returned from a trip to England and France says that "One cannot remain abroad a fortnight without being forced to realize that president Roosevelt is far and away the most popular man in the world. The fact that the Harriman system promises to furnish enough cars to properly handle Pacific Coast freight the balance of this season, is gratifying to all industries and business in general. Every effort will be put into force to prevent a repetition of the delays of the past year. While there is no question as to the shortage of cars, still, the railroads are not entirely to blame. The shippers and receivers of freight while they expect the railroads to break their necks in rushing matters, are not in such a hurry themselves in loading and unloading the cars. Usually the cars are ordered early and the limit of time is taken in leisurely loading them out, and there are too many cases where the full 48 hours is taken to unload a car of freight when it could have been unloaded in 12 hours, and the extra 36 hours the car could have been doing service with other freight. Much time could be saved and the situation greatly relieved if the people would hurry themselves.

The industry of making beet sugar in the United States is greatly on the increase in the United States, Michigan this year expects to produce 300,000,000 pounds of beet sugar.

The letter published in another column from the Oregon Railroad Commission is at least encouraging not only for Morrow county shippers, but for all of Eastern Oregon. Now is the time for the Eastern Oregon counties to get together and work with the Railroad Commission to secure a proper and equitable adjustment of freight rates.

The Times and Wheatfield are wasting a lot of ink over the question of whether or not it would be a benefit to have the Biggs local train come to Heppner. Argument over something that we never had, and furthermore will never get, is it would seem of little consequence. Who cares a snap about the Biggs local anyhow. We have a reasonably good train service for seven days in the week, as it is. The Biggs local would not bring anybody here who did not want to come, and the Wheatfield is right about the impairment of freight service, but the whole thing is a pipe dream. Give us lower freight rates and more cars and there will be no complaint about the service.

In the eleven months of the fiscal year 1,130,615 immigrants have arrived in the United States, which is much the largest number in a like period. During the twelve months of the last fiscal year the foreign arrivals were 1,000,735. In 1898 the immigration footed up only 229,299. The rapid increase of the vast throngs of aliens coming to our shores will probably be checked somewhat by the new immigration law passed by the last session of congress, which went into effect on the first of July. The law contains many new features designed to bring in a better class of immigrants. The head tax is increased to \$4 and the excluded classes are greatly enlarged. Our great national prosperity offers enchanting visions to the crowded hordes of the older countries and necessary restrictions must be rigidly enforced.

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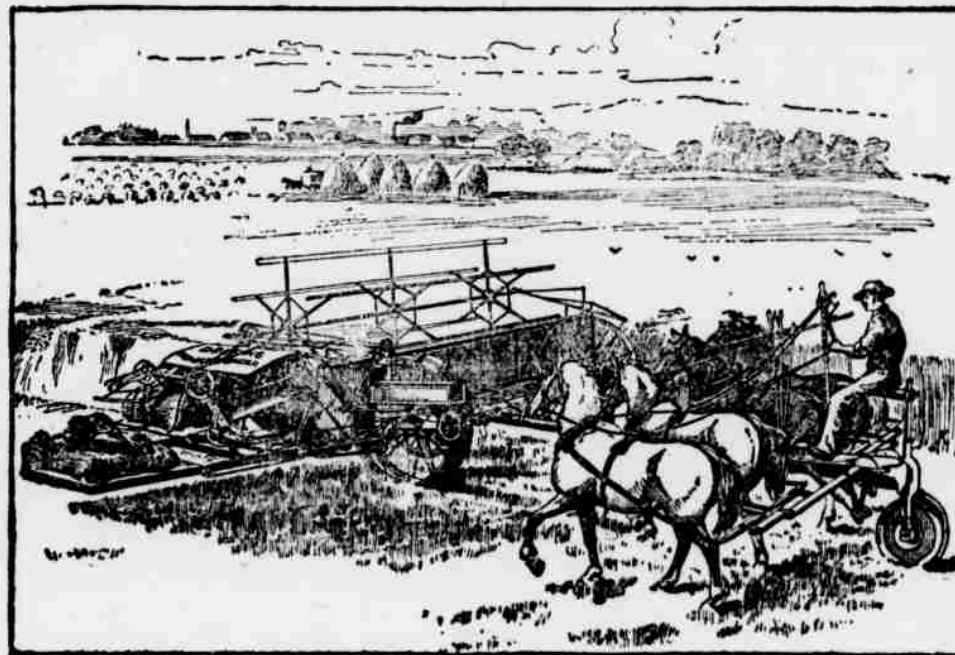
