This will mean destruction to Oregon's beautiful mountain trout until a new law can be passed.

Barney Oldfield who recently flowered the world's automobile record for one mile, tried to commit suicide the other day by attempting to jump from a window of the Portland hotel. This attempt at suicide was in private and raised quite a commotion. When Barney attempts suicide in public before a big audience in an automobile he is a hero. But still there is not much difference in jumping from a tall building or going around a mile track in an automobile in several seconds less than a minute.

Both Morrow and Umatilla counties have been given encouragement from the Railroad Commission of Oregon, in an effort to get lower rates on wheat to Portland. In a letter from the commission to the Heppner Commercial Club published in last week's Gazette, it was stated that the commission would soon take up the matter of freight rates generally all over Eastern Oregon. Now that the eyes of the commission are turned to Eastern Oregon on the question that is of such vital interest, the time is opportune for Morrow and Umatilla counties to get together and work for common interest. Here in Morrow county we have been advised by the commission as to the methods to pursue in making the initial step. The question is, what are we going to do about it. Our petitions that have already been sent in are just beginning to bear fruit. It is not only just and proper, but necessary that the people here who are interested should do their part in helping the Railroad Commission get at the real facts. If we expect to accomplish anything there are certain labors to perform. We are losers every day that this matter is put off.

The unfortunate circumstance of a young woman and her young brother now in the Morrow county jail should be impressive as a valuable object lesson to the girl or boy with wayward tendencies. The boy already on parole from the reform school, with the penitentiary staring him in the face, and the pitiful position of his sister,

from a bad start in life, beginning at the fireside at home, going unchecked in a downward career, culminating in the taking of a worthless watch from their father, is a sad commentary upon the early tutorage by the parentage. It impresses the fathers and mothers of land with that great responsibility of properly guiding the future generation to the high plane of honorable citizenship that is the hope of the nation.

The very foundation of our country is good government. That this principle is being maintained is made prominent by the fact that the grafters are being handled not with gloves, without reference to station or wealth. Even John D. Rockefeller's great wealth could not keep him from the iron grip of the law which places him on the equal with every other man. The latest is the case of Mayor Schmitz of San Francisco, the prince of grafters. From an obscure and poor musician, Schmitz was given the highest gift in the hands of the city of San Francisco. By collusion with a disreputable gang and fraud, Schmitz sold his honor, betrayed his trust for millions, but today stands a convicted felon to serve time in the penitentiary at San Quentin. Schmitz is entitled to no pity and has well earned the just reward for perjury.

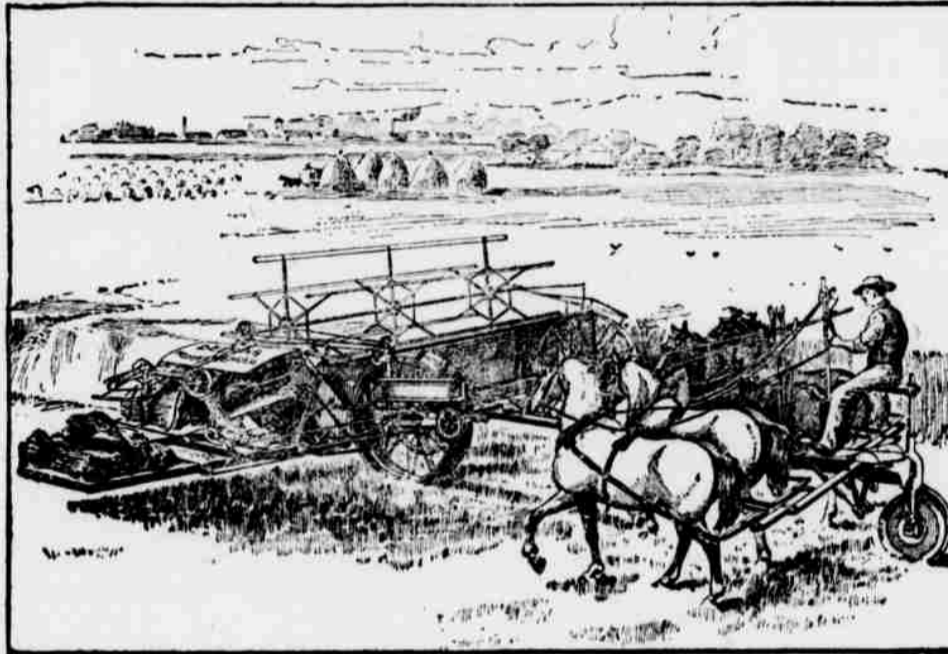
