WORLDS OF COAL

And That of the Finest Quality.

Opinion of Practical Mining Man
Who Recently Visited Willow Creek Field.

Mr. Jones who came from Seattle to investigate the proposition of mining the Willow creek coal mines to get coal for Heppner was out to the mines the latter part of last week and examined the field.

Mr. Jones after looking over the proposition decided that in order to get out the coal it would be necessary to put in a pump, and with the other necessary preliminary work and expense to properly mine the coal would make it too expensive for the few people interested in getting a winter's fuel supply.

Mr. Jones who was brought up in the coal mines, having had long experience both in Wales and this country, was greatly impressed with the Willow creek field.

He says that there is a large body of the finest bituminous coal and all that is needed is to mine it.

Echo interested.

The Echo Register in speaking of the fuel situation says:

"There is no use of Echo or Heppner being short on coal or paying exorbitant prices for the same, with a coal mine 35 miles from Echo and 20 from Heppner.

"In this connection, and with the prospect of a scarcity of fuel this fall, it is an opportune time to agitate the question of building a railroad to this mine. A stock company formed for this purpose would receive a good dividend upon the money invested from the coal business alone, to say nothing of the business of handling the grain and other crops in the vicinity that the road would traverse.

"The matter is deserving of the attention of the commercial bodies of Heppner and Echo.

A North Yamhill man harvested over two tons of Royal Anne cherries from 75 trees, less than an acre.

A North Yamhill man has an acre of prunes that has yielded \$1000 a year for three years and will yield \$150 this year.

On less than an acre of ground near The Dalles, a man will raise four tons of cabbage. On an acre he will clear \$500.

Less than two years ago a Myrtle creek man was trying to sell his 80 acres of land for \$4,000, but this year he has sold it in three tracts for \$8,000.

PROSPEROUS SEASON

Wool Business Cleaned up
in Morrow County.

Three Million Pounds of Wool and 90,000 head of Sheep Sold in This County.

The wool season for the year 1907 is now a thing of the past in Morrow county as well as the spring shipping and selling season for sheep.

The last of the wool was shipped from the warehouse of the Morrow Warehouse Milling company this week.

About 2,500,000 pounds passed through the Heppner warehouses while half a million pounds of the lower country wools were shipped from other points on the Heppner branch.

The bulk of the wool was sold around 19 1-2 cents per pound.

There was a large sale of sheep owing to the unusual high prices offered for sheep.

About 90,000 sheep have been shipped and trailed out of the county this season.

Taking it all around 1907 has been one of the most prosperous years in the history of the sheep business. The lambing season was very successful owing to the favorable climatic conditions and the big prices for both wool and sheep have put large profits into the pockets of the sheepmen.

The wool season all over the state is now practically closed. The last big sale was at Elgin where 400,000 pounds were recently sold at prices ranging from 18 to 20 5-8 cents per pound. About two thirds of the clip of Wallowa and Union counties have been previously disposed of at private sale at an average of about 19 cents, so the growers who held for the sealed bid sales were well pleased with the result.

From a half acre a man near Milton has sold \$244.40 worth of cherries, and that, too, when they were only \$2 per crate and the frost killed part of them.

HARVEST IN PROGRESS

Crops Well Matured and
Beyond Danger.

The Yield Will be Equal to the Big Crop of 1891-Quality Never Was Better.

Harvest is now general in the lone and Lexington wheat belts and will soon be general all over the county.

This is the first year that combines have been taking a prominent part in harvesting the grain. There are now several in operation and it is said that these machines will take the place of the header on the larger ranches.

For maturing wheat and for harvest work the weather is all that can be desired.

From all over the county reports are flattering.

County Assessor Conner who owns a big wheat ranch in the lone wheat belt visited his place last Sunday. He brought back a sample of fall club wheat, a sample of Early Wilbur spring wheat and also some volunteer. The wheat was all ripe and ready to cut. The heads were large and exceptionally well filled with wheat of first quality.

Mr. Conner says that he was not only pleased but surprised when he looked over his 410 acres of grain. He says that all through where he visited wheat looks good. He thinks that the yield will equal the bumper crop of 1891.

John Schmitz took up a homestead over a year ago, and this summer, on new ground and without irrigation, he has an acre of potatoes that will yield \$170, 8 acres of wheat and rye each, 14 acres of oats and 19 acres of barley all of which will yield well, and four horses, three cows and 300 chickens, also a house, his place fenced, etc., and farm machinery, all paid for from the returns of two crops.

One Sherman county wheat field of 400 acres will yield 40 bushels an acre.
