FATAL
ACCIDENTEddy Kenny Killed While
Operating Hay Rake.

Pinned to the Machine by a Powerful Lever he Was Terribly Crushed.

Eddy Kenny, the 13-year-old son of Mike Kenny, of Sand Hollow, was killed by being struck with the lever on a hay rake, Tuesday morning. News of the sad affair was telephoned to this city soon after the accident.

The boy went to the field to take the place of an older brother to rake for a short time. The machine is arranged with a powerful lever to dump the loads by hand in case the self dumping arrangement should fail to work.

In some way he was struck with the hand lever in the breast and was pinned down against the machine when the horses stopped holding the lever against him and crushing out his life.

The unfortunate lad was found a short time after the accident occurred.

A number of Heppner people attended the funeral yesterday at Sand Hollow.

EXTENDED TRIP
IN EUROPE

Dr. Higgs Returns After Year's Absence From Heppner.

Dr. Higgs who left Heppner a little over a year ago, returned Monday, after having spent most of the time in Europe.

After taking a course in eye, ear, nose and throat in Chicago, the doctor sailed for Europe, landing at Hamburg, Germany, after a two week's voyage.

From Hamburg he went to Berlin and visited the clinics, afterward going to Liepsig, Dresden and Munich, also visiting Zurich, Switzerland, and Naples, Rome, Venice and Vienna, studying for several months in the latter city. Leaving Vienna he went to Bar-men, Germany, through Holland, and to London, sailing from England on June 14, coming across in seven days.

The doctor says that the poor people in all of Europe are having a very hard time and it is no wonder that many are coming to the United States.

Taxes in all of the kingdoms are very high. He says that he was told by a business man in Vienna that it took about 35 per cent of his income to pay his taxes.

Standing armies and the royal families seem to be expensive luxuries, causing a spirit of unrest that is apparent everywhere.

The doctor visited the summer home of the Kaiser. The palace was built 150 years ago by Frederick the Great and is a marvel of luxury, being filled with priceless paintings, while the gold and silver decorations are elaborate in the extreme. This is only one palace out of 51 owned by the Kaiser, costing millions.

Germany being only about the size of the state of Illinois, makes it a hard proposition for the people, still on account of being a better country, Germany is more prosperous than either Austria or Italy. In Europe crops are bad this year.

The doctor says that he was greatly impressed with Rome and the historical sights to be seen in the ancient city.

Dr. Higgs is glad to get back to Morrow county and thinks that this is the best country on earth.

The regular civil service examination required of employees in the forest service commenced Tuesday morning and was finished Wednesday.

There were four applicants for the examination as follows:

The examination is general on practical questions pertaining to the forest service. Grazing, the classification of brands, camping, timber scaling and cruising, packing and use of the compass are among the questions that the National Forest employees must be familiar with.
