FISHING GOOD ON WILLOW CREEK

Pleasant Day on Upper Water Above Heppner.

In company with A. W. Goodman a Gazette representative spent the day last Sunday up on Willow creek at McCullough Bros. place. The day was all that could be desired being cool and pleasant and the trip was greatly enjoyed. The clear and cold waters of Willow creek were whipped with rod and line for a short distance and a nice string of mountain trout was secured. While mountain trout are always delicious they seemed at this time to be a little better than common.

The heavy rain last Thursday greatly increased the volume of water in the creek as well as making the water much colder and trout were never nicer at any time of the year.

The speckled beauties were not eager for the fly, in fact they almost refused to be decoyed to the top of the water by artificial bugs, however they fell victims to the young and fat grasshoppers that are just now coming on.

The upper Willow creek country now presents a pleasant contrast to the brown hills. The alfalfa fields present a luxuriant growth of the second alfalfa crop, and the numerous stacks indicate a good hay crop this season. Most of the grain hay is now in the stack, however a few fields of the later sown grain are still standing.

The rain storm of last Thursday was unusually heavy for this time of year. The ground was thoroughly soaked and harvest operations were suspended for several days. There was very little if any damage. The weather since has been cool and pleasant and very favorable for harvest weather.

WIDENING THE COLWELL GRADE

A. J. Cook Has Contract for Blasting Out Solid Rock.

The county court has employed A. J. Cook to improve the Colwell grade by widening out this piece of road.

Mr. Cook with one man commenced on the work last Monday. The contract calls for the widening of the grade of from two to three feet for a distance of two miles. This is a difficult job, requiring much blasting for the reason that the cut for the entire distance will be through almost solid rock.

This grade for the reason of being so narrow always has been a dangerous piece of road and the widening will make a great improvement.

Mr. Cook expects to finish the work along about the second week in September.
