

> The dam forming the reservoir for the Athena waterworks went out, and the town is threatened with a water famine. While the damage amounts well up into the thousands it is impossible to form anything near like an accurate estimatte. Representative Barrett, telephoning from Athena tonight. says it is undoubtedly the worst storm of its kind in the history of the county.

The cloudburst occurred on the head of West Birch creek several miles south of Pilot Rock and the little valley of that stream was completely flooded. The water run through the dwellings, washed away all small outhouses and drowned all the chickens, but the greatest damage was to the present crop of alfalfa. The heaviest losers are probably the J. E. Smith Liveham & Livestock Company, the acres of alfalfa ruined.
