400 Cars Fruit From The Dalles.

In my opinion 400 acres of fruit, and perhaps more, will be shipped out of The Dalles this season, says Commissioner Weber. This includes the shipments by express.

At the packing houses of The Dalles Fruit Company and R. H. Weber large numbers of women and girls are busily employed packing the fruit, and in the former also preparing it for canning.

Prunes and pears are receiving attention and they are both a large crop; unusually large it might be said. Yesterday a car of Hungarian and Italian prunes were sent out from the Weber packing house, and seven cars of fruit have preceded this from this house. Ten of fresh fruit have been sent out by The Dalles Fruit company, not to mention the canned product, which is being shipped all over the east.

The trouble this year is not in getting the fruit so much as in securing sufficient help to get them ready for shipment. Of prunes, peaches, plums and pears there is an immense yield in this vicinity, but help is scarce.—The Dalles Chronicle.
