CASH VALE FOR ALL PROPERTY

New Law Increases Labor of Assessor.

The new law passed by the last session of the legislature which provides that all property shall be assessed at cash value, will increase considerably the work of Assessor Conner in this county.

The property was assessed in accordance with the old law, at one third value by Mr. Conner.

The new law provides that the county judge, clerk and assessor shall constitute a board of equalization, to meet at the court house in the several counties each year on the third Monday of October.

Before proceeding to the equalization of the rolls, each member of the board shall take and subscribe to an oath, which will be filed with the county clerk, to faithfully and honestly, correct and equalize at full cash value, the assessment roll and all property returned by the assessor.

In order to comply with the law it will be necessary for the board to multiply all totals by three in order to get the cash value.

The change to cash value will not increase taxes. While there will be an increase in the taxable property, the levy will be decreased, and it is not likely that the levy will be over eight mills, and it is possible that it will not reach this figure.

Mr. Conner informs the Gazette that the increase in taxable property will reach \$150,000 at the cash value assessment.

The total amount of taxable property in the county will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000.
