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LIMITED TO 16,000 SHEEP.

Idaho Sheepmen Decide Important Grazing Question.

The executive board of the Idaho Wool Growers' Association, composed of Judge C. O. Stockslager of Hailey, O. F. Bacon of Boise, W. H. Philbrick of American Falls, R. J. Douglas of Pocatello, and Governor Gooding, met late yesterday afternoon in the United States forest service office with Forest Supervisor Grandjean for the purpose of appointing the advisory boards for the Sawtooth and Payette national forest reserves, says the Boise Capital News. The appointments will be made by Judge Stockslager, president of the Wool Growers' Association, and will be referred to Mr. Grandjean, for approval and will then be sent to Washington for approval there.

The board also agreed with Supervisor Grandjean to put the maximum limit of the number of sheep that any one person or company can graze on the reserve at 16,000 head. This number does not affect owners who last season obtained permits for a larger number. Superintendent Grandjean explained that this limit was made in order that a monopoly could not be obtained by large owners buying out the small sheepmen, and it is the policy of the government to encourage a small sheepman in the national reserve.

Other questions of importance were discussed and the meeting proved to be pleasant and profitable.

Governor Gooding stated that some of the large sheepmen were giving sheep to small ranchmen on a stock increase commission, and in that way were getting more sheep in the reserve than the amount allotted to them.

The matter of making each sheepman swear that he is the sole owner of all sheep for which he asks grazing purposes was discussed and will probably be taken up by the forest service, which is investigating this matter.

VACCINE FREE OF CHARGE

Further Improvement of Conditions on Western Ranges.

Washington, September 11.—Further evidence of the government's concern over the improvement of range conditions in the national forests is shown in the announcement just made that stock owners will be furnished free of charge supplies of vaccine for the treatment of stock afflicted with black leg, tuberculosis and other animal diseases. This arrangement has been made by the Forest Service, with Dr. A. D. Melvin, as chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry.

Stockmen holding permits for grazing in the national forests will now be furnished with an effective means of combatting without cost all of the most dangerous diseases to which stock is subject. The vaccine can be obtained simply by applying to the supervisor of the forest upon which the stock is grazed who will at once forward the approved request to the Bureau of Animal Industry where it will be filled. Full directions will be furnished for its use.

The Forest Service and the Bureau of Animal Industry are working hard in an endeavor to eradicate or diminish the common forms of stock disease found on the western ranges and their efforts are meeting with much success. It is anticipated that a large number of stockmen will avail themselves of this latest offer of assistance and as a result the loss of stock will be greatly reduced and range conditions improved.
