The water is 30 feet deep at the low stage of the river the entire length of the proposed site. It is situated alongside of the O. R. & N. railway and has every advantage for the location of an ideal dock. At least that is the opinion of every one who has looked over the property. Surprise has often been expressed that the site has not been utilized long before now for this purpose.

The plan of the growers is to pool their interests and take care of their own grain shipments without being dependent upon the exporters, whose dock facilities are held to be inadequate to handle big crops, such as produced this year, to advantage. It will be a co-operative concern throughout. Backing the enterprise, it is claimed are some of the heaviest wheat-growers in the Inland Empire.

Another drawback they hope to overcome by owning their own dock at tidewater is the difficulty now experienced in placing their wheat on the market when the price suits them. Under present arrangements, it is explained, the majority of the growers are forced to store their grain in private warehouses in the interior. Getting their grain to tidewater has proved a most perplexing problem in the last season or two on account of the car shortage. But after the car service did improve, the capacity of docks at Portland was soon so taxed that free and regular shipments could not be made.

Hundreds of cars were used last season as warehouses, which contributed to no small degree to the car shortage. Had there been ample dock room to take care of all the grain and other freight sent there, it is asserted very little would have been heard of any car shortage. When it is necessary to utilize rolling stock for warehouses, the growers have concluded that it is about time for them to take a hand and try to remedy matters so far as it lies within their power.

In the private warehouses over in the interior the same insurance rates have to be paid as at Portland. Because, as it frequently happens, there is not ample grain in port to load a ship, the exporters are subject to heavy demurrage charges. A few instances of this sort have a tendency to increase the freight rates, the extra cost usually coming out of the pockets of the producers. With this as the situation, they see no other outlook, according to their agents, than to acquire a dock at tidewater of their own and make it a point to keep on hand a big quantity of grain.

More ships will be in the local harbor this season than at any other period in the history of the port. Unless the dock facilities should be increased, every one admits there will be no way to accommodate them, or give them anything like decent dispatch. Even with the few now in the harbor, it is often a problem to find berths for them. Captains of ships were the first to complain of the lack of proper facilities at Portland for taking care of the grain carriers in a reasonable length of time. Besides the majority of the docks are dilapidated structures, which those in a position to judge say ought to have been condemned long ago, destroyed and supplanted by modern warehouses.

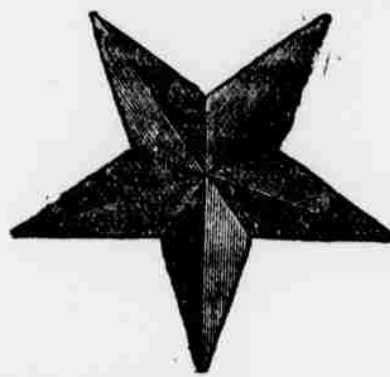
