SHORT STORIES.

GERMAN GLEANINGS.

The Berlin police authorities intend to take severe measures to suppress the practice of playing poker in public places.

The Eye of the Shark.

NO RACE SUICIDE HERE.

Oregon Reported 613 Births and 322 Deaths for August.

If President Roosevelt came to Oregon to live he would find according to the August report of the state board of health that race suicide is a myth so far as Ore onians are concerned, for there were 436 marriages in the month, 613 births and only 322 deaths.

Of the infectious diseases tuberculosis claims 25; typhoid fever, 11; diphtheria, 1; measles, 3; others, 3; only 43 deaths for the month from diseases of this class.

The report tells of the bubonic plague in San Francisco and of the fight made against the spread of the disease in which is expressed the belief that there is no danger of the plague reaching any of the Oregon ports. In regard to infectious diseases the board lays particular emphasis upon the use of towels in the school rooms, urging individual articles for the students to prevent possible contagion.

After stating the symptoms of common infectious diseases the report has the following to say about cerebro-spinal meningitis and the use of towels in the school rooms:

"While the exact method of the spread of this disease is not known, it is believed that the organism which causes cerebro-spinal meningitis is in the secretions of the nose and that the nasal secretions are responsible more than anything else for the spread of the disease. It is thought that the micro-organism will reside in the secretions of some individual and produce no disturbance further than local nasal disturbance, owing to the fact that the individual is not susceptible, or else that the micro-organism has not gained entrance to the meninges, while these same discharges will produce meningitis in a susceptible person.

"Above are the common ordinary diseases, that could be transmitted through the use of a common towel, and the board believes that it would be far better for the scholar to have no towel at all than to be supplied with a towel in common. The proper way to do is for each child to have its own towel and be compelled to use it to the exclusion of all others, just as each child should have its own pencils, books, tablets and other paraphernalia that are at times used in common.

About 250 delegates from Oregon, Washington and Idaho, attended the open river meeting at The Dalles, last week. One of the main points at issue at this meeting was the extension of the portage railroad from Big Eddy to The Dalles. Since the organization of the Open River Association in 1894, the association has collected \$13,000 from the river counties of Oregon and Washington. Over half of this amount has been used in aiding the state in the building of the portage road. Dr. Blalock, the veteran open river enthusiast stated that he believed half a million dollars could be raised by public subscription to be used in the construction of river boats. Nothing could be of more importance to the people of the great Inland Empire than the opening of our great natural highway, the Columbia river.
