At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Insane Asylum called upon motion of Secretary of State W. S. Benson, Dr. Robert Lee Steiner was appointed superintendent of the asylum to succeed Dr. J. F. Calbreath, to take effect January 1, 1908. Dr. Steiner was formerly a resident of Salem, but has been practicing medicine at Klamath Falls the past three or four years. Governor Chamberlain as was expected and previously announced, voted for the continuation of Dr. Calbreath.

**FEEDING CATTLE.**

Large Numbers Will be Fed on Butter Creek.

Ten thousand head of cattle will be fed upon Umatilla county alfalfa during the coming winter, according to the estimates of the Echo cattle feeders. Of this number the Frye-Bruhn company of Seattle will feed 3,000 head for their own use next spring.

This company has already purchased 4,000 tons of hay in the Butter creek country and is now gathering cattle from Wallowa, Grant, Umatilla and Morrow counties for winter feeding. They are determined to have fat cattle for the early spring and so have engaged in the feeding business to furnish this supply.

Fifty-four carloads, comprising about a thousand head, are being received this week from Elgin, and a portion of a 2,500 head purchase in the Izee country is also being received at the Butter creek feed yards.

Aside from the Frye-Bruhn company many individual feeders will feed large numbers of cattle in the Butter creek and Hudson bay districts and from all prospects now Umatilla county will feed the largest number during the coming winter that has ever been fed in the county in one year.—East Oregonian.

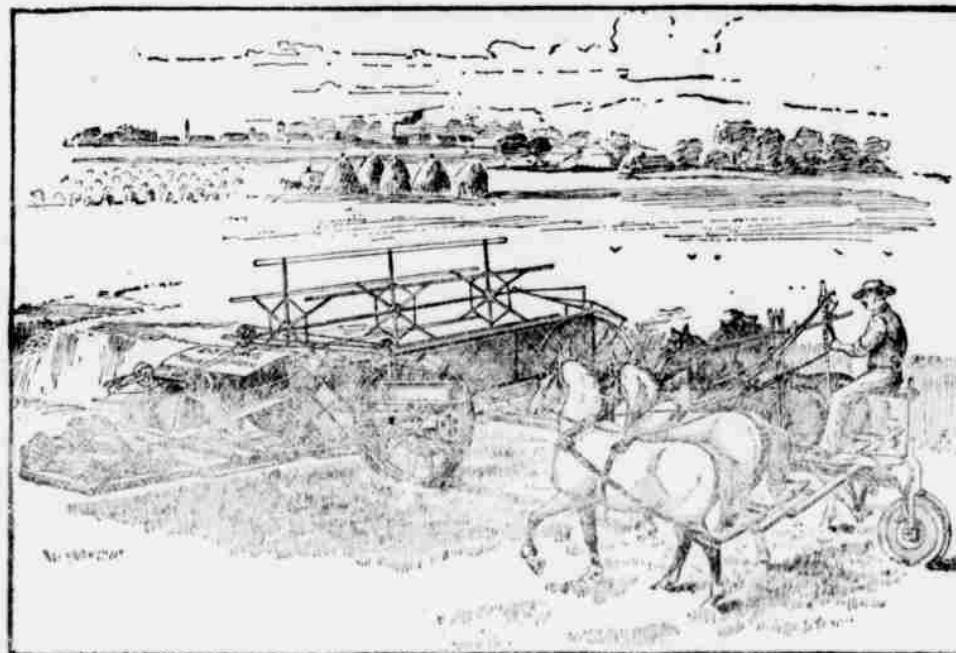
