HOBOES
IN JAILBroke in Depot Warehouse
at Ione.Arrested by Sheriff Shutt—Three
Men Implicated and Have
Confessed.

Three typical hoboes giving the names of Lewis Howard, Wm. Noss and John Moore, are now in the county jail in this city, having confessed to the crime of breaking into the O. R. & N. depot at Ione last Monday night, where they broke open and robbed a trunk.

The three men walked up from the main line at Heppner Junction, Monday. They stopped at Ione, and slept in the depot office Monday night.

During the night they broke into the depot warehouse and picking the lock of a trunk belonging to Chas. Breshears which was stored in the warehouse, took a suit of clothes, watch chain, ring, underclothing and several other articles.

Tuesday morning, the fact that the warehouse had been broken into and the robbery of the trunk was discovered.

A telephone message advising Sheriff Shutt of the robbery was immediately sent and the officer started in pursuit of the robbers.

The three men had walked up the railroad track toward Heppner and were captured by the sheriff at a point near Marion Evans' place.

They had all of the articles stolen in their possession when taken, and they were landed in jail.

The men have confessed to the robbery, and the case is a clear one. Circuit court will meet next week and the men will be given a speedy trial.

ASSOCIATION TO MEET.

Oregon State Wool Growers As-
sociation to meet in The Dalles.

One of the strongest industries in this section of the state will have some of its most prominent and active representatives in convention here November 13. The industry is wool growing and the convention is that of the State Wool Growers' Association.

Secretary Dan P. Smythe, of Pendleton, is endeavoring to make the affair a success and has during his travels created quite an interest among the wool growers of the state for this state meeting at which some of the questions vital to the wool industry will be discussed.

So great has already grown the interest that the convention will hold a two days' session. The following circular letter has been sent out by Mr. Smythe to every member of the association where ever the address was obtainable. Delegates are expected from all wool growing centers in eastern Oregon.

"The 10 annual meeting will be held at The Dalles, Oregon, Tuesday, November 12th and 13th, 1907. The O. R. & N. Co. has made a reduced rate of one and one-half fare for round trip."

"This meeting promises to be the most important ever held. A two-days' program is being arranged. Some of our congressmen, prominent sheepmen, officials of the bureau of animal industry, forest service, and state will address the meeting."

"The method of the proposed federal leasing of the public domain and the use and control of forest reserves are most important, and vital to the sheep industry in this state. These with the new state sheep law, predatory wild animals, tariff revision, salt, better markets for wools and mutton, and the general condition of the sheep industry will be some of the most important questions before the convention."

"We hope to make this a bumper meeting. If you are not already a member, come to the meeting and join the association. We must stand together for our mutual protection and benefit. We want you to come personally, without fail."

Better Than Leap Year.

Seattle, Nov. 2.—With the avowed purpose of inducing American girls to come to Japan and marry Japanese, Maro Takayano is in Seattle.

He wants 10,000 girls if he can get them on the Pacific Coast. He will canvas, Seattle, Tacoma, Portland and San Francisco he says.

Takayano says that all expenses of the trip to Japan will be met by the association of Japanese and if the women are dissatisfied with the country after reaching there they will be sent home.

Takayano says that this inter-marriage is the only solution of the racial troubles between the countries and if 10,000 American girls took Japanese husbands the mutual dislike and suspicion would disappear.

GRANT WINS
WRESTLING MATCHTwo Falls Out of Three From
Gordon.

A big crowd, including a number of ladies, witnessed the wrestling match between L. A. Grant, physical director of the Heppner Athletic club and R. W. Gordon, the traveling professional, last Monday evening.

Two fast preliminary wrestling matches between local members of the club helped the humor of the crowd for the main event.

Glen Jones and Albert Adkins went to the mat for the first bout and proved to be evenly matched. After a lot of hard tugging the match ended in a draw.

Earl Gilliam and Martin Johnson were the next contestants and they went at it good and strong. What they lacked in science, they made up for in earnestness. Young Johnson got the decision after a hard tussle.

For the main event, Grant was the first to enter the arena, taking his chair at the south corner of the big mat.

A little later he was followed by Gordon who sat at opposite side of the mat.

Dell Ward was selected as referee, and Mayor Gilliam acted as time keeper.

Both men were stripped to the waist, Grant wearing black tights and shoes, while Gordon's clothes were red with white shoes.

Gordon appeared to be in better condition than Grant and looked strong and muscular.

Grant who is the larger man looked a little fat.

At the call of time there was not much time lost in the social handshake, for both men went at it for business. The first holds were taken with slaps that sounded like father's hand on the naughty boy.

In the first breakaway while both men were on their feet, Gordon got a swing that sent him from the mat and it was hard work to keep from sprawling on the floor.

Back at it they went and were soon on the mat. Both men showed considerable ability in getting out of close places. In several instances when the fatal spots on both shoulders were just on the verge of decorating the mat, the air would suddenly be filled with arms and legs and grunts and the work had to be all duplicated.

Grant won the first bout in 13 minutes by securing a hammer lock and scissor hold around the head, which brought out a storm of applause.

After a rest of 15 minutes, the gladiators again jumped onto the mat and both appeared fresh and strong. This time it was different. After some fast work, Gordon was successful in getting a half nelson and chancery hold and Grant left the imprint of his big shoulders on the mat in six and one half minutes.

Gordon was loudly applauded.

After the fifteen minutes rest the wrestlers were going again for the winning bout and the long end of the gate receipts.

Grant seemed to realize the fact that it was not the proper thing for all of his shoulders to play carpet sweeper on the canvas.

The third round was faster than either of the previous bouts and Gordon was soon on the defensive. Time and time again he wriggled out of the tightest places with just only on one shoulder, but finally
