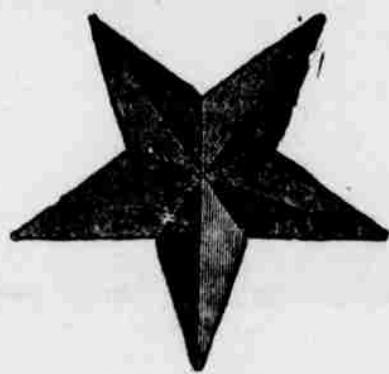

J. O. ALLEN KILLED

Shot to Death by Dan P. Doherty.

Tragedy Occurred Late Friday Night in Saloon at Lexington —Doherty in Jail.

Dan P. Doherty shot and almost instantly killed J. O. Allen in A. D. Inskeep's saloon at Lexington last Friday night.

The shooting occurred at a little before 12 o'clock.

Doherty, who owns a saloon in Lexington, let his license expire and his place of business was closed at the time of the tragedy.

Doherty, who had been drinking heavily went into Inskeep's place late in the evening and in an altercation over the matter of treating, pulled a revolver and fired five shots.

News of the affair was sent to this city soon after the shooting and Sheriff Shutt accompanied by Coroner Yeager and Deputy District Attorney Notson left for the scene of the tragedy at about 1:30 a. m. Saturday morning.

The inquest was held at about 4 o'clock.

Coroner Yeager impaneled the following jury:

E. L. Berry, D. A. Porter, Wm. H. Padberg, A. D. Inskeep, A. P. Parker, and C. H. Breshears.

Howard Lane was the first witness examined. He testified that he was behind the bar in Inskeep's saloon at the time of the shooting.

Doherty asked Allen to treat, which he did. Doherty insisted upon his treating again. Allen refused. Had dispute and Allen grabbed Doherty by the neck. Mr. Padberg interfered and told a len that they had gone far enough.

Allen turned and walked away, but turned again and struck Doherty. Lane ran from behind the bar and met Doherty pulling his gun. The first shot struck Allen's hat. Doherty fired four more times and then ran out of the house. Allen staggered back to a chair in the back room of the saloon and said he was shot through the side.

Lane ran for a physician and when he returned five minutes later Allen was dead.

Lane testified that it was his opinion that Allen imposed the quarrel upon Doherty.

Dr. R. C. Hunter was the next witness.

Dr. Hunter stated that Lane called him about midnight. Found Allen lying on the floor of the saloon dead from gunshot wound just below the seventh rib a little backward of the center of the side. Also found wound on right arm just above wrist, also another glancing wound on breast.

Wm. H. Padberg testified that he was in saloon with Doherty. Mr. Breshears came in and Doherty asked him to treat which he did. Allen was lying on billiard table. He was asked to treat by Doherty. Refused second request to treat.

Doherty called him cheap. Allen caught Doherty by the neck and pushed him up against corner of the bar. Lane said that wont do, and Allen stepped back. Doherty again asked him to treat, when Allen said that he would hit Doherty if he asked him to treat again.

After the shooting Doherty ran out and was captured by Padberg and brought back to the saloon. Took revolver and pocket knife

from him, which were turned over to the marshal.

C. H. Breshears testified that he did not hear much of the conversation and saw nothing of the fight but saw a revolver in Doherty's hand.

D. A. Porter stated that he saw but little of the trouble. Saw a pistol in Doherty's hand.

The verdict of the coroner's jury was that Allen came to his death by a gunshot wound produced by a revolver in the hand of Dan P. Doherty and fired by said Dan P. Doherty.

Doherty is now in the county jail. He is a married man and an old resident of Morrow county and is well known.

Allen came to this county about three years ago from Eugene and has worked at ranch work during this time. He is a single man. He was an Odd Fellow and his funeral was conducted Monday by the Odd Fellows.

A Dallas man was found guilty of shaking dice and fined \$40.
