

The annual county teachers' institute came to a close last Friday afternoon after a very successful three days' meeting.

President P. L. Campbell of the State University at Eugene, and Prof. L. R. Traver, of the State Normal school at Monmouth, were present, and gave very interesting and instructive lectures, both at the day and the night sessions.

Prof. Traver spoke on Wednesday evening. He gave an interesting talk with regard to the advancement of country schools, and also recited many instances where in even the schools of some of our better towns are neglected.

President Campbell's talk, on Thursday evening, dealt with scientific problems, and the manner in which he handled his subject shows that he is thoroughly capable of conducting the affairs of the big school at Eugene.

There were forty teachers present, and County Superintendent Stratton pronounced the institute one of the most successful ever held here.
