The building of an immense packing plant at Portland will be of great benefit to the entire Northwest. While it is true that the beef trust will be placed in closer touch with the meat situation of the Northwest, still the great packing plant will open up a greater market that must stimulate the stock industry in order to be prof-

itable itself. It means much for the city of Portland, and a greater Portland means a greater Oregon.

Little has been said or thought of Heney's attack upon Senator Fulton. The attack came from a revengeful spirit, the prosecutor taking advantage of his position in carrying out Heney methods. But Heney is a republican now, and of course there was no politics in it.

### TOO MANY VARIETIES.

State Grain Inspector John W. Arrasmith, of Washington, who has just returned to Tacoma from an extended trip through the cereal districts of his state, says that the wheat growers are making a mistake in growing so many varieties of grain.

The inspector gives some good reasons in the following recommendations:

"I would recommend that Turkey red and Jones be used for fall sowing in the arid and semi-arid sections for a winter wheat and bluestem be used in these sections for spring wheat.

"In the heavy soils of the humid districts fort-fold, white amber and Russian red are the best varieties for fall sowing, and little club and red chaff club for spring wheat. All of these varieties are good milling wheat with the possible exception of red Russian and I regard it as a fair milling grain when raised under good conditions.

"At the present time the farmers are growing a number of types of club, a number of bluestem and also of red. We ought to grow only about two of each kind. This would greatly simplify the grading of the grain, and the wheat exported from our state would be standardized in the markets and we would get much better reputation all over the world than we now have.

"The buyer would know exactly what he was getting and the seller what he was selling. As it is now, cars containing several varieties of wheat are shipped to inspection points and it is impossible to grade this mixture satisfactorily and we consequently have a mixture of grades.

"Such wheat is not worth as much to the miller as either one of the varieties making the conglomeration would be worth standing alone, and the result is that the value of the entire car is impaired from the miller's standpoint. This condition has only obtained in recent years, and it is becoming a serious knock to the grain industry of Washington."
