IN THIS EXCEED IMMIGRATION.

Immigrants came to the United States last year to the number of 1,124,844. Estimates of births in the United States, based on available statistics, place the number anywhere from 3,000,000 to 8,000,000. The lack in many places of systematic record of vital statistics makes it impossible to give definite figures.

Taking the lowest estimate, it is evident that the population is being increased much more rapidly by births than by immigration, and that the fears sometimes expressed lest native-born Americans may be outnumbered by aliens are baseless.

While many of the adult aliens yearly arriving in this country may divide their love between their adopted and their native lands, the millions of children who are born here every year will grow up as American.

Figures as to the foreign invasion look large when taken by themselves, but when contrasted with the home product there seems no cause for fearing that substantial Americanism is threatened.

Wool.

The restricted demand for wools would be a reasonable excuse for considerable anxiety in the Boston, New York and Philadelphia markets, but for the fact that there is a general belief that the worst has been passed and the next change will be improvement in demand and stronger prices.

There are two particular reasons for this hope and belief; first, from the fact that manufacturers have no large supplies of wool in their warehouses, and secondly, from the probable attitude of the growers, who for two years have been remarkably prosperous and who will not easily capitulate at the present price basis that is being talked of for the new clip. Both reasons are logical. We

cannot see how it will be possible for the manufacturers to run through to the new clip wools without liberal purchasing from dealers' stocks, as provision must be made for the finishing up of the very un-satisfactory heavy-weight season with old wools, and it is the finish of this same heavy-weight season that promises to give strength to the closing weeks of the old wool year.

The grower promises to stand pat for the first part of the season at least. He cannot, and does not expect as much for his wool as he received last year, but neither does he expect a slaughter price. He will hold out, and so will dealers who have suffered severe losses for the past two years, and the result should be a rapid house cleaning of old wools along in April and May when buyers are coming back to the New York markets to buy generously, unless signs fail. If this buying develops, and there is no price basis for new wool a read upon, and it will be later than May in our judgment before the new price basis is fixed, manufacturers must have large supplies of wool or go out of business. In the past when wool was actually needed for consumption, there was very little price dickering, and as we view the situation, the price dickering, if any, after the first of April will be upon a considerable higher basis than at the present time.—American Wool and Cotton Reporter.
