GEORGE CONSER.

In the death of George Conser we have lost one of our foremost citizens.

In many ways Mr. Conser was a remarkable man. Aggressive, fearless, honest, he leaves no enemies, for every one who knew him was his friend.

Big hearted, faithful, and loyal to everything that was good, few men were his equal.

Heppner and Morrow county will keenly feel the loss of George Conser. For every public enterprise, his name headed the list. For the public good he worked with all his forces with that unselfish zeal characteristic of the man.

If anybody needed help, somehow Conser was always there.

The great respect, the magnificent floral display at his funeral today was a fitting tribute.

During his long residence in Heppner, Mr. Conser rarely missed a funeral. The highest and the lowest, the hottest day in summer, the stormiest day in winter, could not keep him away. Sometimes the procession only consisted of the hearse driver and the big headed banker by his side, but he was there to drop a flower here, a tear there, and always a kind word which brought sunshine to lighten the burdens of the heavy hearted.

Long residence and at the head of a big financial institution, Mr. Conser was a prominent factor in the growth and development of Morrow county.

While his successful business career can soon be forgotten, his noble traits of character can never be forgotten by any one who ever knew him.

As the flowers are still fresh on his last resting place, Morrow county is in mourning today with sorrowful thoughts of the passing of a man whose life stands as a monument for which the human race should feel justly proud.

The secretary of state's office has a force of half a dozen people at work mailing the pamphlet containing the initiative and referendum measures and the arguments pro and con, which must be done according to the terms of the statute. The mailing room of the secretary's office has been glutted with mail sacks for several days and although seventy-six of the big government mail bags have been filled with the pamphlets and sent to the postoffice, only about twenty-five thousand of the books have been mailed, out of a total of 125,000. Each pamphlet requires three cents in postage. State Printer W. S. Duniway states that the printing of the petition and other work connected with the proper observance of the primary law constitutes the greatest volume of printing ever turned out at any one time by the state print shop since its establishment. A few days ago he became completely swamped and was up against the proposition of having 250,000 impressions made in an outside shop or of installing a new press. As the rush is only temporary he concluded to have the extra volume of work taken care of outside. Salem Statesman. 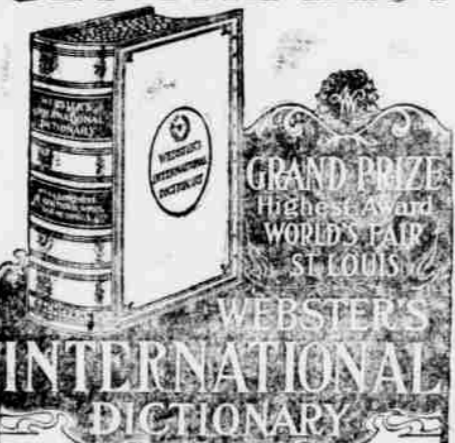
