According to the latest reports of the Portland Commercial Club, the grain crop of the Pacific Northwest has exceeded every estimate made by commercial organizations, railroads, newspapers, and exporters.

The 1907 crop of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho was: Wheat, 58,000,000 bushels; barley, 13,000,000 bushels; oats, 12,000,000 bushels. Farmers received fifty millions of dollars for this crop. More than fifty per cent of total marketed was shipped from Portland. Morrow county's share of this great crop was more wheat per capita than any other county in the Northwest.
