At the appeal in the Times last week the readers no doubt winked one eye and kept the other closed but we want you to open them and keep your vision directed to the advantages that may be had from this park.

If the ladies are not going to become interested, then to the sterner sex we drop our knees so to speak in this cause. Has Heppner 200 loyal citizens we ask, out of its population of 1500? If so, will a petition receive from each of the 200 a subscription of \$10. Now that is not much to put out for a sure return of pleasure and comfort. It will go a long way too towards purchasing the land and making such improvements as are necessary for present use. There is a relative good in the possession of a city of a public square or allotment of ground that cannot be over estimated. Services of a religious nature conducted once or twice a month in the open air with the blue canopy of heaven visible and the strains of sweet music floating echoes among the hills impresses one far more than all the eloquence within four walls with nature shut out. There are people who would be reached far sooner than dragging them through a church house door. There would be less danger of contagious diseases being spread. We vouch for our brothers and husbands that they would not sit at worship with hat in one hand and watch in the other barely restraining themselves until the benediction.
