are eliminated city government will be less expensive. However, this is not the experience of towns that have closed their saloons. For instance Hood River an eastern Oregon town near by, in 1904 closed its saloons. It found the cost of maintaining city government in a dry town very nearly as great as it was while saloons were running, and in the general election of 1906 it voted for licensed saloons.

The country taxpayer may say that is a matter in which he has no concern—that it is none of his affairs how much the business men of the town are taxed—but if he will stop to consider that every merchant, mechanic and professional man who lives in town enters into his expense account what he has to pay as taxes, and that in order to protect himself against loss adds to the price he fixes on the goods he sells to the farmer or the service he may render his customers, therefore any additional burden he has to bear comes indirectly out of those whom he serves, in the way of increased prices, hence the farmer is indirectly interested in keeping the rate of taxation even in the towns down to the minimum.

Heppner and Lexington have been cited above because of the fact that the other two incorporated towns of the county—Hardman and Ione—did not collect a special city tax last year. However the former had two saloons paying \$600 license each, and the latter two paying \$700 each. Had they been deprived of the revenue from this source a high special tax would have been required in both these places.

These are cold facts that cannot be gotten around; the expenses of city governments must be met, if not a portion of it from license, then all must come from direct taxation upon property. Which do the calculating property owners want? It is their privilege to say on the last of June.

The Stranger's Club Room.

Reader, was it ever your misfortune to find yourself in a strange city or town of a cold winter day, with no friend to greet or welcome, with no place to go except a stuffy, uninviting room in a boarding house or hotel? If so you can probably appreciate what the saloon means to the traveler who is away from home and friend, or who perhaps has neither.

The saloon door is ever open to him, here he can form acquaintances and perhaps make lasting friends, there he can go when the rest of the world is closed to him. It possibly may be said he said he had better go nowhere than to the saloon, or that if he finds himself away from home and friends he had better lock himself up somewhere alone, where evil temptations cannot be thrust in his way. But human nature craves companionship. It is unnatural to be alone. Men become unlike real men who do not mingle with the world. So long as this is the case, why should the stranger be deprived of his "club room"? Why should he be denied the right to associate with others and find acquaintances, or at least a comfortable place to spend his time simply to satisfy the whim of some fanatic?

The existence of public places of resort, saloons, etc., does not necessitate their being frequented by those who do not find congeniality there. He who does not approve of them is not compelled to visit them, but however pronounced he may be against saloons, he should not take upon himself to "be his brother's keeper," but should be sufficiently liberal minded to grant to others the right to go where they will. If saloons are closed throughout the community will those people who are instrumental in closing them supply as comfortable places for the entertainment and reception of strangers as the saloons afford?

GOOD CLIP IN IDAHO

Average Weight and Better Quality.

The Boise Capital News says of the prospects of a good wool crop and excellent prices in Idaho this year: Reports received in the city this week from the various sheep shearing camps in the southern part of the state and tributary to the Oregon Short Line indicate that the average clip is being made and that the wool is of a very much finer quality than usual. This would indicate that sheepmen will realize a good market price for their wool, regardless of the fact that there is a movement on foot by eastern buyers to offer a low price and stick to it.

The first clipping, in which thousands of head of sheep were involved, took place at Branneau and samples of the wool which were brought to this city indicate the quality is very fine.

Local sheepmen state that they have received reports from various other sheep camps of the northwest, which are to the effect that the same good quality of wool is being realized.

Another four-horse coach will soon be put on between Prineville and Shaniko. Business has developed earlier than usual this spring and the extra coach is necessary to handle it.

The "70" company recently bought the entire holdings of the XL company, the price being \$250,000, for which the purchasers receive in the neighborhood of 6,000 or 7,000 head of cattle, 300 or 400 head of horses and about 20,000 acres of land in Lake county, Oregon, and Modoc county, California.

Coos Bay News: A few shad were caught by fishermen in the lower bay last week. As a general rule these bony fish don't run until May, and then Coos river is full of them for two or three weeks. The demand for them here is limited, most people preferring more fish and less bones.
