Just now there appears to be little doubt but that it is Senator Cake of Oregon. Once the campaign started it was speedily seen that the oft-boasted personal popularity of George the Governor was not so almighty stout as it once was. Various things that some folks have known about our chief executive have come to light, and a lot of folks are today doubtful if George was such a whale of a man after all.

The nearer Oregon makes it reasonable for Cake the better for Oregon. There are a few places where party politics still count; they don't usually in city, county and district affairs; but they do in national affairs, especially in the upper house of Congress, where the majority party gets what it wants and the minority sits tight and waits. Oregon wants a lot of things from Congress; it can never get them through a democratic senator.

The Republican candidate for county school superintendent, S. E. Notson, is a man of experience in educational work. He began teaching when a mere boy, in 1884. From that time until June, 1905, with the exception of one year, he was actively connected with school work as a teacher, a student, or a member of a school board. He has had several years' experience in teaching in the common and graded schools of Iowa; he has had several years' experience in teaching in the common and graded schools of Oregon; and was principal of the public schools of Casper, Wyoming, four years. He has had considerable experience as an instructor in teachers' institutes in Iowa and Wyoming. He has served on examining boards in Iowa and Oregon. He attended the Oregon State Normal School at Monmouth nearly a year in 1887-8. In 1890, he completed the normal course of the Western Normal College, in Iowa. In 1892 he completed the Scientific course of the Fremont (Neb.) Normal School, and in 1895, he completed the Classic course of the same institution. He served as a school officer three years. He holds an Oregon State Life diploma. His experience as a teacher and as a school officer, combined with his normal school training, certainly fit him for the work of the office for which he is a candidate.

## Hood River County.

This bill is submitted under the initiative for the following, among other, reasons:  
 A county is a public corporation and it is apparent that section 2 of article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon, as amended, reserves to the people the right to create a county by initiative vote.

There is no general law for the creation of counties now, and no one knows when, if ever, there will be one. The facts as to area, population and assessed valuation show that we are able to maintain a county government. Out of a population of about 7,500 the desire of a county for the Hood River country is earnest and unanimous with the exception of a small fraction of one per cent. We are assured by leading citizens of The Dalles, Dufur and other portions of Wasco county that they have no objections to the creation of Hood River County as proposed in this bill. More than 400 residents of The Dalles and Dufur have signed the petitions asking that this bill be submitted to a vote at the June election, though forty-five names from Dufur were received too late to be filed with the Secretary of State.

The people of the Hood River country therefore ask favorable consideration of the voters of the State upon this bill for these, among other, reasons:

Because the new county will be a great benefit to the people residing therein and will facilitate the transaction of their county business.

Because as the law stands a county cannot be created by the Legislature; and finally,

Because the people of The Dalles and the balance of Wasco county are willing that Hood River County may be created as provided in this bill.

The assessed valuation in the proposed Hood River County in 1903 was \$908,568 00; in 1906 was \$1,618,670, showing a gain in valuation from 1903 to 1906 of \$710,102 00, or about 78 per cent. The valuation in 1907 was \$2,762,250 00; a gain over 1906 of \$1,143,580 00, or about 70 per cent, showing the proportionate increase from 1906 to 1907, to be almost as great as that in three years from 1903 to 1906.

The proposed Hood River County has a population of about 7,500; an area of about 500 square miles; and twenty school houses, seven of which are graded schools having from two to eight rooms each and with a \$30,000.00 high school under construction.

There will be left in Wasco County, after Hood River County is created, an area of 1,646 square miles, a population of 11,500; and a valuation of \$5,457,720, thus leaving it among the largest and strongest counties of the State.

## Charles Edgar Redfield.

Friday afternoon, May 26, at 2 o'clock, the last sad rites were paid to the memory of Charles Edgar Redfield, who for 11 years has been one of Morrow county's leading attorneys and prominent citizens.

Mr. Redfield and family moved here from Pendleton in the year 1897, and bought the Frank McFarland residence property on North Main street which was swept away in the flood of 1903, drowning his wife and daughter Blanche.

He was recognized as a fighter in courts and never did he quit as long as there was a chance or a court left to appeal his cases.

He was a man of large acquaintance throughout the state, having been a strong democrat and a hard worker for that political faith.

Mr. Redfield graduated from the Albany Law School, Albany, New York, and was admitted to the bar in 1882. He tried his first case before Judge Alton B. Parker and won it. In 1904, he was a delegate from this state to the democratic national convention that nominated Judge Parker for the presidency.

He came West and boomed Ocoosa, Wash., on the Sound for the N. P. railway and in the year 1892 moved to Pendleton where he practiced law until he came to Heppner, later becoming associated with S. E. Van Vactor in the law firm of Redfield & Van Vactor.

About two years ago he was married to Miss Elanore Cameron, one of Pendleton's accomplished and most highly esteemed daughters, and just recently bought the J. L. Ayers property on Chase street and fixed up a comfortable little home.

His connection with the Heppner coal mines is well known to all our citizens.

Charles Edgar Redfield was born in Bloomingburg, N. Y., June 11, 1863, and died in this city May 23, 1908, at 10:40 a. m., after a short illness.

He leaves a young wife in this city heart broken, to mourn his loss along with his aged parents who yet live in Bloomingburg.

Mrs. J. F. Dunn and son Chas. W., of Tekon, Wash, sister and nephew, are the only near relatives in the West. Mrs. Dunn attended the funeral. He leaves three brothers, Will and Frank, of Bloomingburg and George of East Orange, N. J., and a sister, Mrs. W. A. Rutledge, aside from Mrs. Dunn, living in Philadelphia.

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the wife and family.

The services were conducted from the Episcopal church in this city. Rev. Quinney, of Pendleton, officiating.

He was a member of the Pendleton Lodge of Elks and the Woodmen lodge in this city, carrying a life insurance policy in favor of his parents.

The Heppner Lodge of Elks contributed a beautiful floral piece, as well as the Pendleton lodge. A large amount of beautiful flowers were contributed by friends.
