### GET RID OF THE WEEDS

#### Pointed Talk by Geo. Currin.

To the people of Morrow county: What are you going to do about the weeds and Russian Thistle? They are taking your county, and there is no hand raised against them. We are complaining of very poor crops this season and the weeds and thistles are spreading at a fearful rate. No soil on earth could produce satisfactory crops under such conditions. Ten years ago when I came to this county we only heard of Russian Thistles in the North West part, now everything north of Heppner is infested with them and a great district north of Ione is literally taken with them, so much so that the people have actually moved away, seeing that it was useless to undertake to fight them single handed.

We have a stringent law against allowing their growth, but the county authorities here-to-fore have absolutely ignored the law, hence the condition in this county today. It is now up to the present authorities and the people. A prudent farmer, when he plants his garden and the weeds appear, does he lean on the fence and look over and say "Oh there is no use to work the weeds will take it any way?"

No he gets in and cleans this garden out and keeps up his cleaning process to the end of the season and he raises crops in the face of the weaking that leans on the fence. This is what we want now, some one to do things. We have heard a great deal of Prohibition of late, are the people to sit around on the corners and let the weeds and thistles block your streets and take your fields and eat out and poison your very existence—a thousand times more than this weed law was adhered to than any other law we have.

In Umatilla county this weed law is enforced and instead of wheat lands here going a begging at any price, over in Umatilla land is selling for ten thousand dollars a quarter section. Wake up Morrow county, prod up your officials and with a united force clean up the weed pest.

### NO LAMBS SOLD AT LOW PRICES

#### Bicknell Offered But \$1.50 Per Head.

After trying in vain to induce some Umatilla county sheep raisers to part with their lambs R. F. Bicknell, the sheep buyer, will leave for his home at Parma, Idaho. He has been in this section for several days looking over the situation.

According to Mr. Bicknell, he wished to buy 20,000 or 25,000 head of lambs to feed on his Idaho ranch. He offered \$1.50 per head for them but found out that his price was from 25 to 50 cents lower than what was demanded. Also he says that he came here too early in the season. During the fall many sheep men purchase lambs with the intention of running them through the winter, shearing them and selling them for mutton in the spring. This business usually creates a considerable local demand for lambs and it often occurs that local buyers take all of the surplus sheep, leaving none for outside buyers. What the situation will be this fall remains to be seen.

According to Mr. Bicknell, lambs are selling for \$1.75 per head in Idaho at present. To an Idaho man this is equal to a price of \$1.00 at this point as the freight rate is 15 cents per head to Idaho.

Mr. Bicknell was formerly in partnership with F. C. Oxman, but for over a year past each man has been in business independently.—East Oregonian.

### Good Cattle Sold.

One of the best bands of cattle that has been marketed in recent years from Grant county was sold by George Rader at Pendleton last week. These were bunch grass cattle and numbered 104 head. They averaged 1212 pounds and the steers sold at \$3.75 and the cows at \$2.70 per hundred weight.

Eight or ten of this band weighed over 1400 while several were over 1600. The top notch tipped the scales at 1775 but had reached the 1900 mark when he left his Grant county range.

Mr. Rader said to the representative of this paper that there were all manner of grafs worked on the cattle man between here and Pendleton and that they were imposed upon a 1 along the way. Eight cents a head was charged in some localities for pasture over night on scanty grass and water was denied in several places.—Long Creek Ranger.
